From the President

I am finding that being President of GSQ involves a multitude of various tasks. I feel I am a bit like Russ Hinze, who used to be known as the "Minister for Everything" back in the days of the National Party rule here in Queensland. I am sure many of you remember him. Anyway, it makes life interesting, and I don't mind – as long as I get plenty of warning that I have to do something. I will come back to that a bit later.

This month I have been down to Wynnum-Manly to address a Probus club meeting, telling them the basics about family history and why they need to be involved. Probus is an organisation for retired professionals, the average age for this group was about 60-80 and there were about 40-50 attendees. I did a segment called "Just Three Generations" where I asked them 2 questions each about their parents, grandparents and great-grandparents, to see what they really knew. Most failed at the first question about their mothers – and this always happens generally with this segment. So now they knew what they didn't know about their ancestors. Then I asked them – "What do your children, grand-children and great-grandchildren know about you?" Perhaps it is time to do some family history? I think I may have interested one or two enough to come along and see what GSQ can offer them. Time will tell.

A different aspect of time came with a telephone call I took at GSQ a couple of weeks ago, while again filling in as Library Assistant. [I will be doing less of that now so many members have done the Library Assistant training – good on you all] Therese, who is 91 and a lapsed member (for obvious reasons) rang and asked if someone could try and prove her husband's great grandfather's birth. Her husband has passed away and Therese wanted to clear up this last puzzle of their family history. The ggrandfather came to Queensland in 1882, but was born in the US in about 1854 in a "blink and you miss it" speck of a town called New Hudson in New York state – so he says on his two marriage certificates here. Yet he came here via/from Plymouth in England. Why would someone undertake two long sea voyages at that time, to come here? But how would he know of New Hudson if he did not think he was born there? Anyway, I said, gallantly, I would help her out – well, not having a lot of luck just yet. I suspect a surname change of some sort has occurred along the way, which does not help. Stay tuned for further exciting results. I may even have to ask for help!

Now, back to that "adequate warning" I mentioned at the start. On the Saturday of the Anzac Day long weekend, I did a presentation at the Brisbane Council Library at Mitchelton. Just a day or so prior the library phoned to say they only had one booking, but would not be cancelling. Disappointing as the numbers were, GSQ always does these talks because the Council pays for them. So I, or any of the other GSQ presenters, will always go for just one person – at least I was forewarned about what to expect. As it turned out, there were three people there. Huge improvement.
