Also, on Friday last week, GSQ received a call from Telstra regarding NBN Co. Apparently the NBN cable roll-out has gone past the premises, and a breathlessly eager young man named Rory was on the phone to tell us that the cable had become active "just today" and he would like to organise a package for GSQ. He was a bit disappointed, I think, when I did not jump on the band wagon and sign up right away. I explained to him that any change would have to go through the GSQ committee. He then told me it would take some 6-8 weeks from signing up for the changeover to be made. A typical case of "hurry up … and wait!" if ever there was one.


However, I think that signing up early, rather than waiting the full 18 months we are allowed before we would be forcibly moved across to the NBN, would be beneficial to GSQ. This is because GSQ does not usually operate in normal hours of "peak" activity, when everyone is home from school and work – which is what is getting all the bad press at the moment due to slow download speeds. GSQ is open from 10am-3pm weekdays, so speeds should be good. They couldn't be any worse than what we get on our ADSL2+ connection at the moment, anyway. We will see what the management committee decides.

Last Wednesday night at GSQ I launched a Boer War database that will be appearing shortly on MyGSQ. It contains information from the medical examination forms of the men who served in the Queensland Bushman Contingents – about 1800 men in all. To be added to that database is the information of the men who were rejected for failing the medical – because the information recorded on their forms is just the same as for those who were accepted, and is of interest to family historians.

Also, the installation of the new computers at GSQ is just about complete – only two or three to go now. When it is completed GSQ will have a fleet of machines that are all the same type and running exactly the same operating system and programmes. One thing that users will need to be aware of is that with the new machines nothing will be able to be saved to the desktop. Well, it will, but it will be removed automatically at the end of the day. If you currently save items to the desktop, expecting them to be there the next time you are at GSQ – you won't be able to very soon now. You will have to either save items to a usb stick – either bring your own, or buy one at GSQ – or email your items home.

Bookings are essential (see the Events page of the website) and the cost is \$25 for members and \$35 for non-members.




Saturday 19 August 2017 9am to 11.30 Immigration Records with Bob McAllister.


#### **Irish Famine Eviction Project**

If you've got 19th-century Irish ancestry, you should look into the Irish Famine Eviction Project [https://irishfamineeviction.com/] which aims to document evidence of eviction during the Great Irish Famine. The site aims to include the physical location of the eviction, the landlord's name, tenants' names and other details. So far over 400 eviction sites have been located and pinpointed on the website's Eviction Map.

#### **Tithe maps of Wales**

Places of Wales [https://places.library.wales] is a (beta) website created by the National Library of Wales to give free access to the maps, valuations and records of ownership and tenancy that were used to determine the tithes to be paid on land.

The extensive Help section looks to provide a very good basis for beginning to investigate what could prove to be a very valuable new resource.
