From the President

As I begin to write these few words the news about the fire in Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris has shocked the world. How many of us have visited Paris and marvelled at the grand 'Dame!! Some good news stories have been released – the Organ may have escaped ruin, at least some of the stained glass windows are still intact and many of the artefacts are safe. I know that at least one GSQ member was in Paris at the time of the fire – she will, no doubt, have some unique stories to tell upon her return.

May 2019

By the time this edition of eNews has been published we will have celebrated Anzac Day for 2019. It was only in recent years that I discovered that the concept of Anzac Day originated right here in Queensland – Church of England clergyman, Canon David John Garland, was an important figure in the creation of Anzac Day. His part in the very first Anzac Day, commemorated on 25 April 1916 is evidenced in a memorial in River Terrace Park at Kangaroo Point. The memorial is set in the highest part of the Park and adjacent to the beautiful St Mary's Anglican Church. Last month the United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) inscribed the minute book of the historic meetings of the Anzac Day Commemoration committee, cementing the significance of Queensland, and Canon Garland, in the development of Anzac Day commemorations.

Why not use Anzac Day 2019 to spur yourself on to research ancestors involved in military conflicts? More and more information is being released. Should you need assistance to do this, GSQ has a Military Special Interest Group, the next meeting of which is scheduled for the afternoon of Saturday, 25 May at GSQ.

The 2019 Federal Government Election has been called for Saturday, 18 May. There is, however, another very important event on that day – GSQ's Open Day! This event is timed to run 10.00am to 2.00pm and offers both members and non-members the opportunity to interact with fellow family historians, to research using GSQ's resources and to speak with representatives from the State Library, Queensland Registry of Births Deaths and Marriages and the Queensland State Archives. Representatives from many of GSQ's Interest Groups and the Redland Genealogical Society will also be present. There will be Raffles, Food and Giveaways.

By now you should be aware that GSQ is involved in talks with representatives of the Queensland Family History Society (QFHS) with a view to the possible amalgamation of GSQ and QFHS. Many thanks to all who responded to the first communique with regard to amalgamation. There will, I'm sure, be further documents in the coming months with requests for your input. I urge you to respond to these communications, when requested, so that GSQ's representatives on the Amalgamation Sub Committee are able to truly present the views of members.





Surprising answers are waiting to be discovered in this database. In 1833 Britain abolished slavery in British Caribbean, Mauritius and the Cape. A new system of apprenticeships for the emancipated slaves resulted in free men and women tied to unfree labour for fixed terms. The British government (the tax payers) paid £20M in compensation to former slave owners, beneficiaries and agents acting for owners.

A recent project of University College London has resulted in the Legacies of British Slave-ownership Database which is freely available online.


