From the President

June 2019

GETTING ALONG

As I drove past a school this morning, I noticed a sign which read – "Task This Week: Getting Along". I know exactly what it means in a school context – the Principal and staff will be encouraging the students to treat each other respectfully, to play happily together, to be friends etc. The sign certainly made me think of something occurring in another entirely different context at this very moment – the possible amalgamation of the Genealogical Society of Queensland and Queensland Family History Society. Several amalgamation meetings have already been held. All members of both Societies are being kept informed of progress and decisions through communiques. The subcommittee is delighted with the feedback being received from members of both societies and this is definitely informing any decisions that will be made. I encourage all GSQ members to provide feedback when given the opportunity to do so.

Having recently read George Randall's *A Diary of a Voyage – London to Brisbane 1868* my "Getting Along" thoughts wandered to passengers on sailing ships travelling to Australia in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. If they were to survive the voyage and be able to prosper in the new land, surely they'd have to "get along" – in his diary entry for the fourth day of the journey from London on The Planet George wrote "Today, we seemed to be getting more at home – began to arrange some of our things. The week's allowance of various articles was issued to us. It was arranged that we should join in and form one "mess" with seven young men who composed the rest of the intermediate passengers. Naomi made a pudding for us which was very much liked..." So it seems at a very early stage in the journey George and his wife were willing to "get along" with their fellow passengers. Eventually, George and Naomi left the ship in Brisbane and settled (and prospered) in Queensland – as so many others did.

Do you have ancestors who, like George and Naomi, made Queensland their home? Many of us do. If so, don't miss the conference "The power of the past: 160 years of Queensland records, research and stories" being organised by GSQ on 22 June 2019 at the Nazareth Lutheran Centre, Wooloongabba (8.45am – 3.45pm). 

About the conference

Queensland has certainly come a long way since 6 June 1859 when Queen Victoria signed the Letters Patent which declared Queensland to be a separate colony from New South Wales. The first Governor was Sir George Ferguson Bowen and Government documents show the new colony started with nine pence in its Treasury! Things have certainly changed over the last 160 years.



Looking for more advanced research into Irish records? Then this is the webinar for you. The Registry of Deeds is a little-known repository of records dating from 1709. While the original purpose of the Registry of Deeds was to enforce rules limiting the land transactions of Catholics, even before the removal of these rules in 1782, many Catholics of modest means and representatives of Catholic families appear in the memorials. You might also find marriage settlements, leases, mortgages, and wills. The books into which the deeds were copied are available online for free at FamilySearch, as well as the Grantors index and a land index. John Grenham – Irish Roots Irish genealogy and heritage

John's latest post is an interesting and informative one on early lrish newspapers.

Early Irish newspapers are a much under-appreciated source, at least for that small minority to whom they are relevant. That minority was literate (in English), almost all belonged to the Church of Ireland and they were geographically concentrated enough to provide sufficient readers. So the main areas of publication were Dublin (from about 1720), Belfast (1737), Cork (1750), Limerick and Clare (1750), Carlow/Kilkenny (1768) and Waterford (1770).

One thing you do need to know about Google is the G Suite, the paywall version of the Google apps for businesses. Many of the advanced Google apps and features are only available for this version. There is a free version for non-profit corporations, but otherwise, the features are available on a fee per user basis.
