

Can You Find Your Ancestors in These Old English Criminal Records?

You don't have to have murderers or famous outlaws in your family tree to make use of criminal records in your research. If you have ancestors who lived in England in the last three and a half centuries you do not want to miss the vast (and free) collections of <u>The Old</u> <u>Bailey Online</u> and its sister site the <u>Digital Panopticon</u>.

These fascinating pages hold some of the largest collections of "non-elite" people ever published – with records of nearly 200,000 proceedings of the Old Bailey Courthouse in London, which has been in operation for over 400 years.

Here, you'll be able to search your ancestors' names to see if they were included in court cases of every possible type – from petty theft that led to transportation to heinous crimes with heinous punishments (and some with no punishments at all). And your ancestor doesn't have to have been the perpetrator to be included. The Old Bailey project also indexed the names of victims of these crimes, as well as accusers, witnesses, and family members.

While The Proceedings of the Old Bailey online hold the trial records, the Digital Panopticon attempts to build a story around the lives of these individual convicts by connecting them to other databases – including additional criminal records and censuses.

As family historians, we're sure to love anything that helps us trace life experiences of our ancestors – even if it is involving their criminal lives.

Online Genealogy Records Can Disappear: Simple Ways to Protect Your Research

These days, millions of people have family trees online, with facts and sources gathered from the many online databases that are available via paid subscription sites and free genealogy archives. If you yourself have created a family tree with numerous records to prove your facts, you're doing a great job. Adding sources to your tree is one of the most important things you can do for your research.

But, be aware, some of these sources could just disappear. No warning, just gone – because online record collections are not guaranteed to stay online, or publicly accessible, forever. If you're not downloading the records that you use as sources (and are simply linking to them as many people do) you could find that you lose access to these sources in the future.

Q. What do I do with my DNA matches that don't have family trees linked to their results? Are these matches useless?

A. DNA testers might not have online trees for many reasons: They're primarily interested in ethnicity results. They're adopted and searching for birth families. They're brand-new to family history and don't have a tree. They got the test for Christmas and aren't all that interested in the results. They lost a job or got sick.

No one's obligated to provide DNA matches with a public tree, but it can be difficult to do genetic genealogy without one. But these no-tree or private-tree matches are far from useless.
