REMEMBERING ELAINE LUCAS

Elaine joined the Genealogical Society of Queensland during the 1990s while she was still working as a mid-wife. After she retired she became very active in the Society.

Elaine became President of the Society in September 1999 until October 2005. To help her understand the "workings" of the Society, she read the Constitution and read all the previous minutes that had been taken since the Society began in 1978, and this helped her tremendously during her time as President.

Along with Christine Smith and Mavis Dimick, she was responsible for all the indexing of the State's cemeteries



after they had obtained permission from all the local Councils in Queensland. These indexes were produced in book form, and sold as a revenue raiser for the Society. Elaine was responsible for the orders and posting out of the books. The Councils were given a free copy of the cemeteries in their district.

Elaine held U3A classes on behalf of the Society, did Council talks in libraries, and also held talks and classes at the Societies' rooms from time to time. She was also a library assistant and a library guide for new members. She attended the "Monday Natters" Group and was a very active member of the Society's Scottish Group.

Elaine was an excellent researcher and was always willing to help people with brick walls in their research. She had a deep knowledge of resources and how to use them.

At the beginning of her membership in the Genealogical Society of Queensland, she joined the North Brisbane Branch. She took part in all the activities of the branch and for many years was a library assistant.

Elaine will be sadly missed.

Did you know that GSQ has an active & informative Facebook page?



GSQ Members are reminded that many different posts, seminars and links to various genealogy and family history articles/sites are published regularly on our Facebook page. We also have a Twitter account up & running once more. Scottish Kirk Session records can hold key information such as birth, marriage and death records, information about illegitimacy, poor relief and more.

Sadly, the GSQ Page can only show Free events under the Events tag, so mostly they will be on the Page as Announcements with the very next Presentation (only) pinned to the top of the page until it's held. Note that you don't have to be a Facebook member to view the page, but you will have to login if you wish to get the post automatically each time they are published. 

Thirteen Commandments for Names

- 1. Thou shalt name your male children: James, John, Joseph, Richard, Thomas, or William.
- 2. Thou shall name your female children: Elizabeth, Mary, Martha, Sarah, Ann or May.
- 3. Thou shall leave NO trace of your female children.
- 4. Thou shall, after naming your children from the above lists, never refer to them by those names again; instead, theou shall call them by strange nicknames such as: Boy, Polly, Dolly, or Peggy.
- 5. Thou shall not use any middle names on ANY legal documents or census reports; and whenever possible, use only initials on legal documents.
- 6. Thou shall learn to sign any documents illegibly so that your surname can be spelled, or misspelled in various ways: Tipper, Topper, Hopper, Tucker, or Tapper.
- 7. Thou shall, after no more than three generations, make sure that all family records are lost, misplaced, burned in a court house fire, lost at sear, or buried so that NO future trace of them can be found.
- 8. Thou shall propagate misleading legends, rumours and vague innuendo regarding your place of origin:
 - You MAY have come from England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales or Iran.
 - You MAY have royal ancestry.
 - You MAY have descended from one of the people who came on the First Fleet.
- 9. Thou shall leave no cemetery records, headstones, or headstones with legible names; nor will any of the dates thereon match those in public records.
- 10. Thou shall leave no family bible with records of birth, marriage or death.
- 11. Thou shall ALWAYS flip thye name around. If born James Albert, thou must make the rest of any records in the name of Albert: AJ, JA, AL, Bert, Bart, or Fred.
- 12. Thou must also flip thy paretns names around when making reference to them, although "Unknown" is an acceptable alternative.
- 13. Thou shall name all generations of children with the identical first names, as will all the brothers so that all cousins are named the same.
