Technical Advisory Group (TAG) Report

I am incredibly grateful for the assistance of Judy Lofthouse, Angela Hawes, Glen Dyer, Helen & Howard McKinnon and Alistair Henderson to help this month regarding arrangements at GSQ for the setup of the new computers. The guys spent most of the day under the table sorting out the cables and cords, while everyone else helped to label, clean up, sort out what was and what was not needed, plus the set up of the computers themselves. All this takes time, but everything was ready for GSQ opening on Tuesday 19th Jan 2021.

Each computer is labeled making it easier to find cords etc under the table if need be, and for accurate recording in the Asset Register.

There are also two hexagonal power hubs sitting on the table. Giving 3 power points and 2 usb charging points each. This will make it easy for members using laptops and wanting to charge mobile phones. No more getting under the table to find a power point!

A help booklet containing the log-in passwords, information about starting up and shutting down the computers, and details on the NSW pre 1856 records on FamilySearch, is also attached to each computer. Expect more information sheets to be added to these booklets over time.

We now have a total of 14 computers on the middle table, 2 on the side wall, 2 of the old computers set up in the back office, plus the computers to use the ScanPro and the old CDs. Giving us a total of 20 computers to use during normal times.

In relation to Covid19 restrictions, we now have a total of 11 useable computers.

You will enjoy using the new equipment and especially the monitors, as they not only swivel, tilt, move up and down to suit sitting positions, but they also rotate 90 degrees so perfect for reading newspapers.

The Secretary's office also has one of the new computers, plus laptops for the use of the President, Secretary and for Presentations. All in relation to the Gaming Grant that we received.

Many thanks goes to the Management Committee members who were also able to put in time and effort to make sure the installation of these computers went well.

On the 2nd and 4th Wednesday nights from 7pm – 9pm, again GSQ will be running a Zoom meeting.




This class is offered via Zoom. Limited to 4 participants ONLY.

Geography shapes our history and hence the lives of our ancestors. Queensland Globe is an interactive mapping website providing access to the spatial information held by the Queensland Government. It is a powerful tool with an extensive array of information that can be overlaid on the maps, but it can be overwhelming for the beginner. This hands-on session will be aimed at beginners including navigating around the Globe, searching for locations by a range of methods, obtaining information about a particular place, and working with the hundreds of built-in data layers (some of which will be included in the presentation).

Some of the limitations of the Qld Globe will also be discussed. Note that Queensland Globe primarily deals with current information rather than historical information, but, as you will see, current information still reveals a lot of historical information, and helps us better understand the lives of our Queensland ancestors.

COVID-19 is not the first pandemic Australia has faced. In early 1918 word was spreading of a virulent disease in the USA and by the end of April had reached the Western Front and England. The southern hemisphere waiting dreading what was likely and in October 1918 it reached New Zealand. "Spanish Flu" infected ~500 million people (1/3 of the world's population) with an estimated 50 million deaths.

The pandemic was handled on many different levels from the Federal government to State governments to towns and individuals. In this time around 40% of the Australian population became ill and 15000 died. In some Indigenous communities, there was a 50% death toll.

We'll look at the progress of the outbreak and what was done by whom between October 1918 and early 1920.

How to Take Better Tombstone Photographs

Headstones are some of the most important records for genealogists. But grave rubbings can destroy the very records researchers try to save. Tombstone photographs will give you all the same information without harming these monuments.

Check out these five best-practices for taking photos you can easily read and save for future study.

- 1. Try to take photos on a sunny day, at a time when the sun hits the tombstone at an angle.
 - This way, the sun will light inscriptions and also create some contrasting shadows.
- Deflect additional light onto the tombstone surface with a mirror or piece of cardboard covered in aluminum foil.
 - Don't use flash photography.
- 3. Don't take tombstone rubbings or clean stones with stiff brushes, harsh chemicals or sharp objects.
 - Don't remove or harm any plants without the sexton's permission. Remove loose debris gently with a natural sponge or soft brush and a light water bath (not power washing).
- 4. Snap several images at different distances and angles. Ideas include: close-ups of inscriptions, all sides of stone with writing or images; group shots of family grave clusters; the cemetery entrance with the name.
- 5. After taking photos, use contrast and brightness features in your photo-editing software to better illuminate hard-to-read inscriptions.

Add the image to ancestral profiles in your family history software and in online public trees. Upload to gravestone websites such as BillionGraves or Find-a-Grave.

The reality is genealogy research takes a lot of time. A lot of it. However, you can be successful in your genealogy research in even short increments of time.

- 1. Check for new DNA matches.
- 2. Send a contact email to a DNA match.
- 3. Perform a genealogy random act of kindness.
- 4. Check "lost photo" sites like <u>DeadFred</u> and <u>Family Old Photos</u> for possible photos of your ancestors.
- 5. Join in a discussion in a Facebook group. (Set a timer!)
- 6. Seek out new-to-you Facebook Groups based on a surname or location you research.
- 7. Create a template for your file names.
- 8. Create a template for a timeline. (<u>Learn more about timelines</u> and find an example here.)
- 9. Write a short summary of an ancestor.
- 10. Read a helpful blog post.
- 11. Create a location guide for a location you need to research.
- 12. Begin the analysis of a document. Don't worry if you do not finish. Just continue when you have another 15 minute time block.
- 13. Watch a YouTube video about a "new to you" topic in genealogy. Check out the *Family History Fanatics YouTube* Channel for great (and quick) videos.
- 14. Upload your Ancestry DNA results to MyHeritage or FamilyTreeDNA (small fees may apply).
- 15. Download free blank census forms to have for quick reference the next time your research.
- 16. Bonus! Put future research times on your calendar.
