Do You Enjoy Researching? You Could Be a Research Assistant at Our Centre.

Have you ever considered becoming a Research Assistant at GSQ, but have just not taken "the plunge" to do so. Because of COVID, the number of Research Assistants able to travel to GSQ to work in the role has diminished. Research Assisting can be a really fulfilling role – just think, it could be you who helps another member locate a vital piece of information – you can get almost as much "buzz" (maybe even more) than when you find something for yourself.


What qualifications will you need? You'll need to be able to operate a computer and to know something about Family History Research – you certainly don't need to be an expert at Family History Research!! You will be provided with initial training to ensure you're familiar with the resources available at GSQ, including what is available through our computers. Part of this training will be the pairing of you with an experienced researcher for as long as you need to feel comfortable in the role. Research Assistants are also required to arrive earlier to ensure that the Centre is ready for the researchers to arrive – this entails unlocking the premises, starting up the computers and putting on the urn. At the end of each "shift" COVID cleaning needs to be done – this isn't an extensive task –can be completed in 5 minutes once you know what is entailed.

There are also small administrative actions to look after as well. These involve answering the phone and checking for messages and attending to members requests to purchase goods (usually books), services (like education classes) and tending to new members and member renewals. Again, training will be provided for these activities.

Now could be the right time for you to step up – you decide whether you can do one session each month, (approximately 4.5 hours of your time) or once per week or whatever frequency suits you. 

- Attend to any other Admin tasks.


The good thing is that you should be able to do some of your own research!

Special Interest Groups – otherwise known as SIGs

GSQ is fortunate enough to have a number of very good Special Interest Groups. One of the "perks" of GSQ membership is the ability to attend these Special Interest Groups meetings. By doing so, members are able to discover in depth information about a particular area of genealogy, to speak with others who may be able to help them learn more about a particular topic and, generally, get to know more members of the Society. It adds another dimension to GSQ membership!

Currently, we have the following SIGs – Convict Connections, DNA, English/Irish, Family Tree Maker, German, Legacy User, Military, Scandinavian, Scottish and Writing. Monday Morning Natters, always held on the first Monday of the month, is a different type of SIG. In addition some new Groups have been formed to facilitate learning and "getting together" during COVID – these include Monday, Wednesday and Thursday Zoom sessions. Each SIG has a convenor whose task it is to organise meetings and publish details of meeting dates and special topics etc. Those attending SIG meetings contribute a gold coin and collectively, the money raised is used by the SIG to purchase resources for that particular area of family history research.

Convict Connections Group

Convict Connections has purchased for GSQ the Index to the rare John Cobley series of books. Historian Beth Taylor has released this index which includes not just convicts, but also soldiers, sailors, free settlers. Wives and children have not been forgotten! Ships

and place names are also to be found.

You may have seen these books on the shelf at various libraries, but not had the time to sit and read them. Finding a familiar name in the Index however may draw you back to the series.

The author, John Cobley (1914-1989), was a well-recognised New South Wales historian. He was also a physician. As an avid reader he had built up a large collection of books on a wide range of subjects. It was while he was a member of both the Royal Australian Historical Society and the Society of Australian Genealogists, that he saw a need for publishing accounts of the very early years of the colony. His series of books were written between 1962 and 1986!




Wednesday Nights at GSQ via Zoom 7 - 9 pm - 2nd & 4th Wednesday






Explaining Irish Land Records July 3 @ 9:00 AM - 11:00 AM Virtually via ZOOM Presenter: Bobbie Edes


