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From the President

May 2021

Open Day on 17 April was a great success – and the weather smiled favourably upon us as well! Crowds were lower than usual, due to the impact of COVID, but GSQ gained quite a few new members as a consequence of the day. Many thanks to Kim Davis, our Volunteer Coordinator, for her organisation of the day. Our Patron, Dr Jennifer Harrison, spent the day with us – thank you, Jennifer! Thanks too to the many people who contributed home baked surprises for the Café and to all from our Special Interest Groups who worked during the day at the various tables set up in the carpark. GSQ's next Open Day is planned for Saturday, 28 August, during Family History month.

Many GSQ members will be aware of the review headed by Mr David Tune in connection with the work done and services offered by the National Archives of Australia. On 12 March 2021, Assistant Minister to the Attorney-General Senator the Hon Amanda Stoker released the Functional and Efficiency Review of the National Archives of Australia. The 20 recommendations made by the review are now being considered by the Australian Government. Those of us interested in preserving historical documents for future generations need to become actively involved in future developments – the NAA needs increased funding to enable digitisation of vulnerable historical records.

On 12 April a successful members' meeting was conducted via Zoom with 49 people in attendance. Kate Peters presented a case in favour of amalgamation and the remainder of the meeting was spent in attendees asking questions about amalgamation with responses being answered by those present. At this stage the date for the next members' meeting cannot be set definitively – originally, it was planned for 22 May, but the date is dependent on when material is received back from the Lawyer responsible for reviewing the prepared Constitution and By Laws. Members are to receive copies of these documents prior to the meeting to allow informed discussion to take place. You will be advised as soon as a date for the meeting can be confirmed.

New premises, whether for the amalgamated organisation or GSQ, are still being actively sought. Many thanks to those members who have provided suggestions during the past month. Each suggestion is examined and evaluated by the Premises Sub Committee once received. Keep the suggestions rolling in!





Digitised - Protestant (Male) Orphan School Register State Records of NSW

As recently featured in the <u>Sydney Morning Herald</u>, the <u>Protestant (Male) Orphan School Register, 1850-1886</u> is newly digitised and available online! The volume lists over 1,000 boys, from all walks of life, who were admitted to the school. Boys were usually admitted because one or both parents were dead or unable to care for them. The register is an important document in the history of child care and protection in New South Wales.

The register records name, age, date of admission, date of leaving the Institution, parents' name/s and remarks. It is indexed as part of our <u>Child Care and Protection Index</u> and can be searched by name or institution.

Convict Connections Group

The project has been a huge undertaking and one all family historians should be thankful for. Trove has been such a successful aid for research, and I am sure many will also benefit from the National Library's AJCP digitisation.


Wednesday Nights at GSQ via Zoom 7 - 9 pm - 2nd & 4th Wednesday

Finding female convict voices: exploring their lives



We will examine what sources are available, and how reliable is their information? The most systematic collection of relevant data comes from the ships' indents, documents transferred on arrival from the surgeon superintendent to the colonial authorities. Indents included information about the prisoner's crime, trial, and sentence, and from about 1828 included personal information about literacy, religion, marital status, number of children.

The emphasis on "voices" acknowledges the fragile, ephemeral nature of this knowledge and serves as a reminder of prisoners' limited literacy, which, in most cases, prevented them from leaving a written record for posterity with their own pen. BOOK HERE




Search Guide to EllisIsland.org and Online Ellis Island Records By Rick Crume

Shipping companies kept detailed passenger lists, called "manifests." Before the Ellis Island passenger lists were indexed, finding your ancestor on a microfilmed manifest was nearly impossible if you didn't know the ship's name or approximate arrival date.

EllisIsland.org

Launched in 2001, the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation, Inc. website www.ellisisland.org now has a searchable database with 65 million records of passengers and crew who entered the Port of New York from 1820 to 1957. Volunteers from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints transcribed microfilmed lists to create the original online index; names in the database link to images of the passenger lists on which they appear. You can search the database and view the lists for free, and purchase immigrant certificates, copies of passenger manifests and photos of ships.

Four Steps to Finding Italian Ancestors By Sharon DeBartolo Carmack

Navigating the ropes of finding your Italian ancestors can be tricky, but those of us who've been tracing our Italian roots since the Dark Ages, long before the word online existed, have managed just fine. In fact, I traced my DeBartolo and Vallarelli lines back to the mid-1700s without leaving US shores and without the aid of a computer. If I can do it, you can, too—following these four key steps.

Numero Uno: Research Names

If you know the town where your ancestors originated, you're one step ahead to connecting your immigrant ancestor to his forebears in Italy.

Numero Due: Search Passenger Lists

Next, move on to other US genealogical records such as births, marriages and deaths, again checking under both the American and Italian names.

Numero Tre: Find Your Ancestral Hometown

Once you've exhausted the potential records America has to offer on your ancestor and learned his Italian hometown, it's time to cross the Atlantic.

Numero Quattro: Check Italian Records

Armed with the name of the town, province and region, check the online catalog at *FamilySearch* to see what Italian records are available.
