A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome to the New Year everybody! While it hasn't started on a great note with COVID infections in our community, the optimistic side of me is still hoping for a great year for us all – a year filled with opportunities for learning, research and socialising. At this stage the plan remains to open our premises for research beginning on Tuesday, 1 February, 2022. There will be a separate communication which will include guidelines for us all to help keep everybody safe and well.

The big news for this edition of eNews is that we'll be remaining at Wishart in the short term. While I haven't yet signed the new Lease, this action should occur within a reasonably short time. It is proposed that our new Lease will expire on 30 June 2024. A Members' meeting has been organised for Monday, 14 February 2022, commencing at 7.00pm via Zoom to discuss the reasons for this decision and any other matters members wish to raise.

From the Treasurer

I have been asked to update the membership on the financial structure of GSQ at the turn of this year. I don't propose to supply numbers in this short piece but more focus on the broad-brush aspects of the Organisation.

As announced by the President earlier in e-news we have secured a continuation of our lease at Wishart. The assessment of potential other sites, right up until hours before the latest Management Committee, and the associated protracted negotiations with some potential landlords did make this a 12th hour decision. The main consideration for staying was that we have been able to negotiate a

rent at a reduced rate that, although more than we wished to pay, only made a move marginally attractive. Given that the landlord gave us a fixed lease until 30th June 2024 the process

of finding a new home will need to start in 18 months' time by the then Management Committee.

Revenue streams: Currently the main Revenue streams are Membership, of course, followed by Education, Bookshop and Research.

There does not seem to be any adverse reaction to the Membership Fee increase as our membership has been steadily climbing over the last six months and the Management Committee have strategies in place to support all members and continue to increase the overall membership.

Education seems to have suffered most because of COVID and the limitation to online presentations rather than the convivial face to face presentations. I am aware that the Education Committee is taking active steps to seek a wider reach of participants.

The Bookshop has been an ongoing source of income and was recently boosted by the "Moving Sale". The

bookshop is branching out to supply Family History Organisations throughout Australia & New Zealand with the My Family History book which it has acquired exclusive distribution rights to. In addition, it hopes

to launch, soon, a HUGE range of Genealogical books. Stay tuned.

Research is seen as a potential income stream that is yet to be fully developed and plans are in place to increase its profile.

The continued generosity of members making donations and bequests is also appreciated. Overall, the year to date has us ahead of budget principally due to cost limitation so we as an organisation need to continue to improve our revenue streams.

Tribute to Robert (Bob) McAllister

23 February 1952 - 7 January 2022

Bob (Member Number 5806) joined the Genealogical Society of Queensland in 2014. He was an exceptionally helpful member of the Technology Advisory group, enjoying the challenges facing the Society's increased online presence. When second hand computers were purchased for use at GSQ's premises, it was Bob who created and enacted a plan for their best use. The interface created by Bob is still used on the bank of computers used by Society members at our premises today. His logical thinking and systematic planning contributed to the success of many GSQ activities.

It was quite an effort for Bob to get to GSQ, at both East Brisbane and Wishart, via public transport, requiring him to catch a train and buses.

This effort was greatly appreciated -those who shared his library assistant roster days, either as volunteers or visiting members, valued his extensive

knowledge of social and family history. On the rare occasions he didn't know the answer, those present benefited from his problem-solving skills. If he still couldn't solve the problem, he always knew someone who could!

Bob was a great presenter. I remember fondly his presentation at GSQ's "The Power of the Past" Seminar in June 2019 – his presentation, titled "Miegunyah - A house full of history" was enjoyed by the large group present. Family History research, for some, results in information being written on countless pieces of paper, with some data never to be found again. In 2019 and again in 2020 Bob provided GSQ members with the answer to this dilemma with his presentation "Organising Your Research – the Digital Way". Bob's methods are still used by many GSQ members today.

Members enjoyed and learned from Bob's informative and entertaining presentations, blogs, and webinars. GSQ members have used words such as "amazing", "always willing to help", "nothing ever too much trouble" and a "great listener" to describe him. Members of GSQ's German Special Interest Group indicated to me that Bob's presentation to that group was "one of the best talks they've ever had." Behind the scenes, Bob assisted with event planning, website design and newsletters. Such a lot of broad ranging tasks! Those who had the pleasure of exchanging emails with Bob will miss his witty, erudite, clever banter.

Thank you, Bob, from all at GSQ – the family history community has lost a kind and valuable friend.

News regarding FindmyPast at GSQ and the 1921 Census: FindmyPast have disabled the facility to purchase images of the 1921 Census within the library institutions. This is so that credit cards do not get compromised.

You can do FREE searches at the Resource Centre regarding the 1921 Census but to view the actual image or transcription you need to establish a FREE FindmyPast account yourself to use. This will also enable you to search and obtain the images from the comfort of your home.

Just a reminder to please remember to turn off the monitor when finished with the computer, as it not only saves power, but extends the life of the monitor itself.

Not just cat videos...

James Tanner (Genealogy's Star) wrote recently about the Brigham Young University Family History Library YouTube Channel, but pointed out that there are hundreds of other active genealogy related YouTube channels. Some of us learn through reading while others learn more graphically. Do you learn best by watching someone explain and then trying what you learn yourself? You can, of course, also learn from books, but it takes longer, and you lose the ability to immediately try things yourself. People use YouTube for everything from fixing their car to solving questions while using a particular program. This applies to genealogy as well as any other subject.

Now, how do we get started with YouTube? Just ask a question and put the question in the YouTube search field. You may not want to view the first few videos, but scroll down, and see what you find.

Everything else on YouTube works the same way. You search to answer a question and then you will likely find someone who has posted a video discussing the answer.

I could do a long list of YouTube channels that talk about genealogy. Yes, <u>The Family History Guide</u> has a YouTube channel with almost 200 videos. Each of the genealogy companies also seems to have a channel also. You could keep watching for days if you had to recover from some illness or whatever.

A face through time: Further opening up our prisoner of war records

While working on a project to open up the German-created prisoner of war (POW) record cards (WO 416), lan Strawbridge felt drawn to a particular photograph. The individual who captured lan's attention was Jeremiah Anderson, a merchant seaman. lan traced his records and unfurled a story that, it felt, had been waiting over 75 years to be told. His POW records are in WO 416/7/200 and WO 416/407/26.

The POW medical cards reveal that Jeremiah was a migrant from Jamaica who settled in England many decades before the Windrush Generation. Though Ian was unable to determine why he came to England, he did learn that Jeremiah settled in Liverpool and married in May 1918.

On 8 June 1940, Jeremiah joined the *Duquesa* - his second voyage of the war. He was captured six

months later and became part of around 600 prisoners drawn from the crews of several ships attacked by raiders, including the German heavy cruiser *Admiral Sheer*. They were sent to Europe and by 7 April 1941, Jeremiah reached Bordeaux.

Medical cards were used by the Germans to determine which prisoners they were willing to exchange. Jeremiah was repatriated to the UK in January 1945, based in part on an assessment of his cardiovascular health. However, he continued to serve after the Second World War, with his final voyage on *Maria de Larrinaga* ending in July 1955. He passed away in 1957.
