This is a virtual recreation of the building and its records recovered worldwide since the project began a couple of years ago. Jennifer also talks about the destruction of the Garden Palace in Sydney in 1882 and the many records it held, a relatively unknown fact amongst Australian genealogists.

What's news - updates from the Genealogy Community ...

Beyond 2022: Ireland's Virtual Record Treasury online from 27 June 2022

Beyond 2022 is an all-island and international collaborative research project working to create a virtual reconstruction of the Public Record Office of Ireland, which was destroyed in the opening engagement of the Civil War on June 30th, 1922. The 'Record Treasury' at the Public Record Office of Ireland stored seven centuries of Irish records dating back to the time of the Normans. Together with their 5 Core Archival Partners and over 40 other Participating Institutions in Ireland, Britain and the USA, they are working to recover what was lost in the fire, including digitising the first population census of Ireland before the Famine.

On the centenary of the Four Courts blaze on 27 June 2022, the Virtual Record Treasury of Ireland will be launched online. Many millions of words from destroyed documents will be linked and reassembled from copies, transcripts and other records scattered among the collections of their archival partners. They will bring together this rich array of replacement items within an immersive 3-D reconstruction of the destroyed building. For full details, see the Beyond 2022 website.

TheGenealogist

TheGenealogist has released almost 60,000 records from the 1851 Dublin City Census Index. This new release will be a great aid for those researchers with ancestors who may have been living in Ireland's Capital City on 30 March 1851 at the time when the census was taken.

Researchers will find the Index to the 1851 Dublin census to be a wonderful tool for anyone searching for people in Dublin city in the mid-nineteenth century. It provides the names and addresses of approximately 59,000 heads of household and was compiled by Dr D A Chart.
