A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

The Times They Are A-Changing':

Like me, I guess you are looking forward to the changes that Friday, 4 March will bring to us in Queensland – I'm referring to the predicted amendments to COVID 19 rules, of course. Once we know exactly what's involved you will be advised as soon as possible about the new conditions under which GSQ will operate.

Another change that's occurring is that GSQ's Northern Branch will close at 23 March. Margaret Holding has been President of the Branch since 1988. On behalf of all GSQ members I would like to thank Margaret very sincerely for all of the work she has done during that time to keep Northern Branch thriving. Margaret's leadership ensured that GSQ members who lived in the inner northern suburbs of Brisbane had an additional centre at which to explore their family histories. Thanks indeed Margaret for your years of dedication!

During the Members' meeting on 14 February a question was asked about whether a QFHS member could participate in a GSQ Special Interest Group (SIG) meeting. I was asked to clarify the position. Following the cessation of Amalgamation Talks with QFHS I wrote to the Secretary of QFHS on 21 June 2021 to outline GSQ's position with regards to a number of matters, one of which was in respect of SIGs. The text of the letter stated "... As from 30 June 2021, members from your Society will be able to attend 2 meetings of a particular SIG without joining GSQ. Should they wish to continue attending the particular SIG meetings, they will be required to do so as a GSQ member." I trust that this clarifies the matter.

I would like to express my thanks to Judy Lofthouse who organised for a group of GSQ members and friends to visit AVEO at Durack on Wednesday 23 February. The 20 people present enjoyed a beautiful 2 Course Lunch followed by a brief tour of the facility. The day was enjoyed by all present and GSQ is to receive \$500 from AVEO. Thank you, Judy!

Changes to two By-Laws were passed at the November 2021 Management Committee meeting. The two By-Laws in question relate to Affiliate and Corporate Group membership. With the increase in Membership fees for GSQ members from 1 January 2022, it was felt that it was important



to have the fees for both Affiliate and Corporate membership "tied to" ordinary single member fees. By-Laws 12 and 15 were changed to reflect this. The amended By-Laws are available on the Website in the About GSO section.

- On Microsoft Word enter the Accession number which is to be printed to be placed on the spine of the item. A piece of contact is used to do this.
- This item is then placed on the library shelf in the correct place.
- This is for books, it is a similar for CD's (consult Ailsa Corlett to determine that the CD is able to be used on the computers.)
- The Journal Editor will email you and ask to be sent a copy of all the items which have been entered for the previous three months.
- All help will be given if required, it is not difficult, just getting used to the process is the key.
- This job can be done either at home or at GSO.

This is for them to file copies of correspondence, files, and anything else they want to save to this area. All links to the drive have been forwarded to all the Convenors and we are hoping they will make use of the space..

GSQ Blogs

Our regular bloggers have got off to a great start this year with more interesting stories for our readers.

In February Jennifer Harrison continued with the early shipping tales, writing about Ships Surgeons employed on all vessels by the Queensland Immigration authorities. Our next blogger was Vicki MacGregor telling us tales of her early Canadian ancestors, followed by Robyn Dean 'Not Just Any Railway Guard' about her third great uncle, Andrew George Lee who was regarded as Australia's longest serving guard and had been a guard on the Royal Train when the Prince of Wales toured Australia in 1920. Also he was a guard when the Duke and Duchess of York (the future King George VI and Queen Elizabeth) made on their journeys around NSW in 1927.

Regular blogger Shauna Hicks then wrote about Ancestral epidemics, relating how in 1832 her 4 x Great-grandparents both died in the cholera epidemic that swept the Midlands that year. This then led into the 1882 smallpox epidemic in the same region, concluding with the thought that we could maybe look into the health of our ancestors over the generations to see how they fared.

We have a great team of bloggers from around the country with overseas guest writers as well, and invite all to read through the weekly blogs and to feel free to comment.

Capturing Brisbane...

The Capturing Brisbane pages are now live at http://www.capturingbrisbane.com and the publication Capturing Brisbane: the City's first photographers 1855 to 1901 is available for purchase.

Supported by a grant from Brisbane City Council, *Capturing Brisbane* explores the development of professional photography in the City through the biographies of the commercial photographers operating here between 1855 and 1901.

Photographers have made a significant contribution towards our understanding and interpretation of the City's past by recording the people and places around them. The familial, social, and business connections between the

photographers and studios that has been revealed is also an important overlay on Brisbane's social history.

In my earlier career working with the City's heritage structures, it was always exciting to find an historical image of the building being researched. Dating the photograph however could prove just as problematic as dating the building itself. The trend by photographers of the era to identify themselves on the front or rear of their sometimes elaborately mounted photographs is an obvious starting point in the dating process.

Simplistically, correlating the image, the information on the photographic mounts, and an accurate history of the photographer provides a way to likely date an image. There are other levels of complexity that might be overlaid on the process, not least of which was the common activity of old photographs being copied by later photographers. This project provides one of those important research criteria - the accurate history of the photographers - and should prove useful to anyone trying to date early Brisbane photographs.

Who should use The Family History Guide and why?

The Family History Guide has been around for some years now and is firmly established as a go-to genealogical and family history educational website. The entire contents of this still-growing website are free to all users. It is my experience that many of those genealogists and family historians who would use and support the website dismiss it without ever looking at its content for a variety of reasons. I thought I would write about some of the perceptions I have observed from people when I mention the website.

First, the website really is free. It is not a freemium website that is trying to get you to pay for advanced or premium services. The *Family History Guide* is fully staffed by unpaid volunteers and is funded by donations. See The Family History Guide Association.

Another common misconception about the website is that it is just for beginners. This is most commonly a perception among established and professional level genealogists. This belief is one of the most obvious indicators that the genealogist has not yet looked or explored the website.

One of the basic research helps that aspiring genealogists are encouraged to accumulate by the professional genealogical community is a research outline of the basic resources for the geographic areas of the world where the new genealogist will be doing research. These outlines usually appear in the form of three-ring binders full of paper. Guess what? All of that work in compiling an outline is almost completely done by the Countries section of The Family History Guide.

One of the most useful functions of *The Family History Guide* website is to provide step-by-step instructions for each of the large online genealogical websites such as *FamilySearch*, *Ancestry*, *MyHeritage*, *and Findmypast*. There is an inherent tendency for many people to ignore the instructions whether it is for a recent purchase or when trying to learn a now topic. The instructions in *The Family History Guide* are there to show you how to get started with all of these websites. Anyone who wants to learn how to use these websites will benefit from the step-by-step instructions and videos.
