Quite a number of GSQ members attended the Biennial History Queensland Conference on the weekend of 21 – 23 October at Redcliffe. The Conference was a great success, despite the miserable weather. Special thanks to Treasurer, David Barnes, who managed GSQ's Tables at the Conference and to Elma O'Toole who assisted despite not attending the Conference. In 2024 it will be GSQ's turn to host the Conference, so expect calls for assistance for this event.

In the October edition of eNews members were advised that, unless a

member came forward to manage the GSQ Bookshop, it would be closed. At the time of writing nobody has indicated willingness to take on the role. Details re the Bookshop's closure appear elsewhere in this publication. I must say that I'm disappointed with this news!!

Pre Separation research: Finding your ancestors in Qld records 1824 – 1859

Prior to the separation of Queensland from the colony of New South Wales in late 1859, thousands of convicts were transported to the Moreton Bay penal settlement, followed by



ex-convicts and free settlers who arrived from 1842 onwards. Unfortunately, some penal settlement registers and early free settlement records did not survive. However, by knowing where to look, it is possible to find traces of Pre-Separation ancestors, both convict and free, in records ranging from the Colonial Secretary's correspondence with Moreton Bay to hospital admission books and court registers.

October started off with guest blogger Mia Bennett with 'Enhancing your genealogy education' explaining the many opportunities now open to genealogists, either online or in person. This was followed by regular blogger Janice Cooper 'Working for the CWA', a story of her grandmother's dedication to the Association, which resonated with many of us who either grew up in the country or have close country family members.
