Constructing a Digital Convict Memorial

Dec 2 @ 9:00 AM – 11:00 AM AEST Presenter: Hamish Maxwell–Stewart Cost: Members \$20 Non-members \$30 Virtual via Zoom

This paper describes the construction of a digital convict memorial in the Penitentiary Chapel Hobart, a site owned and operated by the Tasmanian National Trust. The memorial uses life course data for 75,000 convicts transported to Van Diemen's Land, Norfolk Island and Port Phillip assembled as a result of a series of Australian Research Council funded projects. Designed to provide a means of visualising this data in all of its complexity, the memorial also provides opportunities for the public to interact with the Nation's convict past in novel ways. HMS Sirius March 1790 Booklet

HMS Sirius Norfolk Island 1790 (2023) is A5 24 page full colour booklet being a reprint of the special 2020 publication for the 230th anniversary of the shipwreck in addition to the passenger lists of the 1790 voyage of Convicts, Marines, Civil personnel, Children and the shipwrecked crew who were stranded on Norfolk Island. Cost including postage in Australia \$15.00. Search the Norfolk Island History Publications.

Directory of Norfolk Island First Settlement 1788-1814

Now Online This directory of names created by University of New England (UNE) has identified the individuals associated with the 'First Settlement' phase of the colonial occupation of Norfolk Island from the majority of Norfolk Island primary records. This has expanded immensely the number of names to 3,607 entries by identifying unique individuals compared to the different collated populations lists of the past. A comprehensive range of primary records from all archival repositories was utilised for the creation of this directory not just the Norfolk Island Victualling books, with the evidence analysis of these original records being the source of historical informative details and data. At the same time an in-depth intra shipping lists was also collated for research and cross referencing purposes. The base directory of names is now online. One is able to use the search facility to see name results with that individual's first and last primary record which lists their name. eg James Morrisby, Convict, Scarborough 1788. arriving on Norfolk Island per HMS Sirius Mar 1790 and departed Norfolk Island for Hobart per HMS Porpoise Dec 1807.

From the Museums of History NSW - newly digitised

The State Records of NSW has digitised the *Married Women's teachers' applications for 1932-1935* to view via our online catalogue. In 1932, against the backdrop of the Depression, the NSW Government passed the Married Women (Lecturers and Teachers) Act. This Act restricted the employment of married women in the Department of Public Instruction, which meant that currently employed women faced dismissal and any woman intending to marry had to resign upond doing so.

However, married women could apply for an exemption by completing a statuory declaraction every year explaining their circumstances. Most applied on the grounds of hardship, combined incomes being inadequate to_support a family, supporting husbands unemployed due to illness or injury (especially after service during World War I), or supporting family members.

Civil court records - partly digitised

A selection of the minutes of proceedings from the early Court of Civil Jurisdiction, which operated from 1787 to 1814, have been digitised and are now available online. The minutes include the date of sitting, a summary of the arguments put forward by both parties and the judgement of the court. The court had jurisdiction over all civil matters and heard pleas relating to land, houses, tenements, debts and trespasses. Click on details to view thefull record and if it is digitised a thumbnail will appear.


