Half-year Financial Report: 31 December 2023

I thought the turn of the calendar year was a good opportunity to brief you, the members, on the financial aspects of GSQ. This report does not contain details of total dollars, a Year to Date (YTD) update of these are available in MYGSQ which you will need to log in to view. What I can do is be descriptive about trends.

By nature, the annual budget produced for GSQ is conservative. It reflects all known costs and estimates revenue and other costs. The overall performance for the YTD shows that we are 456% better off than we budgeted for. Yes, I did say 456% !!!

Revenue: All revenue streams, except Bookshop, are greater than budget. Some areas that are worthy of comment are: Fundraising – the principal contributor being the Bunnings BBQ's and we do thank Bob Dean for leading that project (Bob always grabs, where he can, spare slots at Bunnings); Education- is proving to be a good money earner and thanks go to Marg Doherty and all her committee for the continued great work in creating worthwhile events; Membership - although steady in numbers it has generated more income YTD; Research – although the "new kid on the block" is developing into a good money stream with consistent local and overseas enquiries.

The Bookshop is the only revenue stream that has not reached budget and the shortfall is only 12%. As you will be aware GSQ went close to closing down its bookshop last year but thanks to Karma Hodgson stepping into the Coordinator's role we have high hopes for it in 2023.

Overall Revenue is running 37% higher than budget for the year. Cost of Sales

have bitten into this marginally and our Gross profit is 33% above budget.

Operating Expenses: Overall our Operating Expenses are 10% higher than budget. The two principal areas of additional cost are: Electricity – I think all members will have recognised the national dialogue on this topic; Legal Fees – a number of areas including compliance with the Privacy Act and Copyright of IT programs have caused GSQ to seek professional advice, fortunately this is being provided at NFP rates.

As members we must be exceedingly grateful for all those volunteers who contribute their time and their energies to ensuring that GSQ has continuing income streams, apart from membership fees, and continues to be financially stable.

This kicks off in February with most of the researchers attending the "Digging Deeper Program". The next component of training will focus on customers service and researching protocols.

What's news ...

Digital Repository of Ireland (DRI)

The Digital Repository of Ireland (DRI) has announced that the Property Registration Authority (PRA) has joined DRI as their forty-fourth member. The PRA are home to the Registry of Deeds Archive Services. The Registry of Deeds collection consists of parchment memorials, bound volumes known as Transcription Books, Indexes (lands and names), Abstract Books, microfilms and Registry of Deeds administrative records. It includes over 5 million memorials and 17,000 bound volumes. The Registry of Deeds is now embarking on a long-term programme of digitisation including the creation of preservation quality digital surrogates and associated metadata for long-term preservation within DRI

London Metropolitan Archives: The London Picture Archive

Explore the LMA images of London. Our image website *The London Picture Archive* provides free access to over 250,000 historical prints, maps and photographs of London. The images date from 1450 to the 1980s and include all aspects of life in the capital, from the Crystal Palace to Second World War air raid damage. London's schools, churches and workhouses are all included, along with many images of previous generations of Londoners.

1921 Scottish Census

The 1921 census is now online. On the night of 19 June 1921, every household in Scotland was asked to fill in the census. The personal information they shared has been kept confidential for more than 100 years. From 9 a.m. on 30 November 2022, the 1921 census was opened for the first time and made available on the *ScotlandsPeople* website and in *ScotlandsPeople Centres*.

These records provide a glimpse of what life was like for people in 1921; where they lived, who they lived with and their occupations. For the first time, the census also records where people worked, if children had been orphaned and who was eligible for benefits under the National Insurance Act of 1911. Get ready to search 4.8 million records.

What is the cost: There is no charge to register and view the live webinar. However, the recording is available to view for the next 7 days - for free! Watch it as many times as you would like, pausing and taking notes, during the free viewing period.

If you cannot make the live event, downloads of the recording are just \$9.95 each or yearly memberships give you access to everything.
