A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

A Grant Application has been lodged for the Super Round of the Gambling Community Benefit Fund which closed on 28 February, 2023. The application, if successful, would involve the digitisation of many of GSQ's Microfiche and Microfilms and also some of our Map collection. Club Southside has advised that its Grant Applications for 2023 are now open – GSQ will be applying for a Grant from that source as well.

ZOOMZOOM

Through phoning members, our Membership Officer, Kerry Beeton, has discovered that there are some members who do not know how to use Zoom. If this is a problem for you, then you are certainly missing out on quite a lot that your GSQ Membership provides! When you discover how simple it is, you'll wonder why you have not begun using Zoom earlier!

Step 1: Go into the Search Engine of your choice and Download Zoom on to your device (Desktop Computer or Laptop – you can use Zoom on a Mobile Phone, but it's probably not the easiest thing to start with.) Your device will require access to Speaker/ Microphone and to Video. If you have an older device without these facilities, plugging in a WebCam works very well.) When your download is complete, some instructions for using Zoom should appear – you could print these or take some notes, should you wish to do so. You should now be ready to join your first Zoom Meeting!! **Step 2:** The Host of your meeting will email a Zoom Link. Around 10 minutes prior to when the meeting is due to start, click on this Zoom Link and you will be taken to a "Waiting Room". Your Host will receive a message that you are in the Waiting Room and will admit you.

Step 3: You're now ready to join in the meeting's conversations.

Oral History Workshop

Oral History Queensland is holding a face-to-face workshop on 25 March 2023 at 12 Payne Street, Auchenflower. The workshop will be run by OHQ President Elisabeth Gondwe who has a Master of Arts in Anthropology and Archaeology from James Cook University. Elisabeth has worked as an oral historian for 30 years and brings a strong oral history focus to her role as the curator at the North Stradbroke Island Museum on Minjerribah. She has designed and delivered many community oral history projects.

This is an introductory workshop and would suit people who are commencing an oral history project. It will provide an overview of an oral history project, ethics and permissions, an introduction to interview techniques and recording, file management and transcribing. Headstones galore from Ireland Genealogy Projects Archives

Another big bundle of material has been donated and uploaded to <u>Ireland Genealogy Projects Archives</u> over the last month.

The package included photos, updates and transcriptions for headstones in seven burial grounds, and the addition of another year of baptism register transcriptions for Fethard Parish in Co. Tipperary; this latter collection now runs from 1810 to 1820.
