A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

GSQ lost one of its long term members during the past month with the passing of Mavis Dimick. Mavis joined GSQ in 1986 and so was a member for a mammoth 37 years. Mavis was not just a name in a membership list – she “gave her all” to GSQ. Not only was she actively involved with the Scottish Interest Group, but also had an intricate knowledge of the Library and its resources – she volunteered to help visitors to our Library for many years. In 2021 Mavis was awarded Honorary Life Membership of GSQ, a very well deserved accolade! Rest in Peace, Mavis.

News has reached GSQ that on Friday 14 April 2023 our wonderful Patron, Jennifer Harrison, was announced as the latest recipient of the Wallace Clare Award, an Award named in honour of Reverend Wallace Clare (1895 – 1963), the founder of the Irish Genealogical Research Society. Wallace Clare was a Catholic priest and keen academic and the author of the first ever book on Irish Ancestral research titled “*A Simple Guide to Irish Genealogy*”, published in 1937. Hearty congratulations, Jennifer, on receiving this prestigious award!

Have you looked at GSQ’s Bookshelves lately? If you have you will have noted that many of them are in poor condition. They’ve served GSQ very well over the years but are coming to the end of their useful life. The Management Committee has applied for a Grant to replace at least some of the shelving through a Brisbane

Thank you to those members who supported Cailin and helped her increase confidence in her own abilities during her time at GSQ. GSQ Patron, Jennifer Harrison latest Recipient of the Wallace Clare Award

The Council of the Irish Genealogical Research Society has announced that the latest recipient of the Wallace Clare Award is Dr Jennifer Harrison.

Dr Harrison's contribution to the study of Irish genealogy and history in the Australian state of Queensland is unrivalled. Over decades she has conducted in-depth research on original material in Ireland and Australia to expand the understanding of migration from Ireland to Queensland of convicts, free settlers and members of the colonial administration. Her experience as a genealogist and an academic historian has given her the skills to research and interpret the available records and to enrich the understanding of early European settlement in the colony.

Dr Harrison has been involved in genealogy for over four decades. She is an academic historian with wide ranging interests, primarily in relation to European migration to what became the state of Queensland, Australia. Her work has been acknowledged with the Fellowships of the Federation of Australian Historical Societies and the Royal Historical Society of Queensland. Her study of Irish migration to the state has resulted

in an extensive body of published work in the form of books, chapters in edited works and articles in academic journals. In addition, since the foundation of the quarterly magazine *Irish Roots* in 1992, her regular column on the Australian connection had appeared in every single issue.

In accepting the award, Dr Harrison said *"I am overwhelmed to be the recipient of the Wallace Clare Award, particularly when I think of so many potential candidates all around the world. With my dear friend Dr Perry McIntyre, we have been fortunate enough to have visited Ireland very regularly over the years and in our travels and during our research we have been blessed to participate in many conferences and seminars. Additionally, so many opportunities to contribute to events and to write papers and give presentations over the years have been offered."*

Deceased Online

Two cemeteries from *Reading* are now available to view on www.deceasedonline.com, with records dating from 1843 for *Reading Old* and *Hemdean Road Cemeteries* and records for other sites and maps coming soon. These records comprise digital scans of the original burial or grave registers up to 1993, with computerised information thereafter, and grave details for each of the graves and their occupants

yourDNA Portal New Test

yourDNA has launched a new ancestry test: Laniakea Global. Laniakea is designed to draw out an individual's unique characteristics by capturing their ethnic composition beyond political or cultural boundaries. Laniakea deploys a completely new global admixture test that is able to capture the areas of the world where your genetic markers are more frequent. It uses advanced and customised analysis to refine your ethnicity estimate. The first iteration of the Laniakea project is Laniakea Global. It includes:

- An admixture analysis based directly on the SNP's present in your raw data genome file;
- An indication of the modern genetic clusters most similar to your genome;
- Different ethnicity estimates are refined and parameterised in different & complementary ways, in order to provide a complete overview.

Laniakea Global will be followed by more focused ethnicity estimates, all based on the unique Laniakea admixture test. Laniakea Global can be found on the [Advanced Ancestry Analysis page](#) of yourDNAportal.

The next meeting of our Wednesday Morning Zoom Group is on 3rd May when Sharyn Merkley will be doing a presentation on Google MyMaps. This will be followed two weeks later on 17 May with a session where we all investigate one of our members brick wall ancestors. What's news ...

TROVE

The National Library of Australia has welcomed the commitment made by the Albanese Government to provide \$33m over the next four years to maintain Trove, with \$9.2m ongoing and indexed funding from July 2027. Trove has a place for every story, with 14 billion Australian moments captured for future generations. Most recently, it has been a place for First Nations communities to continue to tell their stories, through the First Australians pages.

The certainty of this funding decision will allow the National Library to continue to provide this essential service, enrich it with new content, and stabilise and secure the platform, in line with the Trove Strategy.

National Burial Grounds Survey: Highgate Cemetery

The National Burial Grounds Survey (NBGS) is the first project of its kind anywhere in the world. AG Intl Ltd has been commissioned by the Archbishops' Council of the Church of England to survey and map every churchyard in England. The project includes photographs of every headstone and memorial and the scanning and indexing of the parish records – baptisms, marriage and burials.

Already underway in the Dioceses of Carlisle and Truro, NBGS will progress systematically, diocese by diocese, across the country. As each diocese is completed it will be available online via the Church of England's Church Heritage Record. Each church will have secure access to view and update its own churchyard map and records.

AG Intl is currently performing a full ground survey of Highgate Cemetery, one of London's Magnificent Seven, and uploading details to their site. They have scanned the registers and each of the 120 paper grave plans which cover the site. Fortunately, Highgate already has a database of their records though transferring each of the 57,000 grave numbers and linking them to the map is a monumental task.

[Scottish Indexes](#) has updated its Scottish Prison Register Index, adding records from the following prisons: Edinburgh Lock-up House 1848-1850, Fort William 1849-1880, Ayr 1893-1897, Paisley 1866-1875, Aberdeen 1896-1908, Dundee 1911-1914, 1922, and Glasgow (Duke Street) 1850-1864.

FREE Family History Webinars from Legacy Family Tree
