A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Annual General Meeting (AGM) for GSQ is looming. Please consider nominating for one of the vacant positions. At this stage we need candidates for: Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. The AGM is to be conducted at GSQ on Saturday, 28 October at 10.00 am and will be a Hybrid meeting, meaning people will be able to join in from home, should they wish to do so.

Some changes are ahead for our library. At the recent Management Committee meeting a decision was made to replace some of the library shelving with removeable shelves on castors - this will mean that we'll be able to open up our meeting space when needed to accommodate more people for meetings and the shelves will be lower and so permit easier access to books and other resources.

As well, the Management Committee also approved a new Library Management System which will be installed during the coming 6 months. This system, named Koha, will replace the outdated, troublesome Catalogue currently available through our Website. It is compatible on desktop computers, laptops, tablets and smart phone devices. You will be provided with updates over coming months.

All members should have received a copy of a **Draft Constitution and By Laws for GSQ** recently.

A cut off date of 31 August for the submission of written comments was advised.

However, there are meetings planned for discussion about the document, the first one being on Saturday 16 September at 10.00 am - this will be a Hybrid Meeting, meaning you can attend at GSQ or via Zoom. A second meeting at 7:30pm on the evening of Thursday, 5 October is a Zoom Meeting.

It is hoped to present the final draft of the Constitution and By Laws at the AGM on 28 October for approval.

GSQ recently hosted a visit from 3 representatives from FamilySearch who expressed real interest in what GSQ does and the unique records we hold. No formal arrangements have been made at this stage.

DNA Group

The August Meeting of the GSQ DNA SIG occurred on 27 August. This meeting was again a Zoom meeting. We have an overwhelming support from our survey to have hybrid meetings. This will start at the October meeting. We had discussion on updates by both Ancestry and MyHeritage. Ancestry improving the Parent Sorting as many of us recently have noticed an increase in number of "Both" parents matches and these may not be correct. MyHeritage is currently recalculating ethnicity, so will be interesting to see the results. The announcement that the Y Chromosome has been fully mapped is great but apparently it is only one version of the Y Chromosome. One of our new members talked about some of the interesting issues she is coming up against in relation to both herself and her husband's DNA and parentage going back. Ideas on using the colour coding Greg has developed for both Ancestry and MyHeritage were explained and shown. A reminder about Privacy and Genetic Genealogy was touched on, along with ideas on how best to spend the money in the bank balance. Greg overwhelmed us again with his wonderful charts and coding he has developed to assist in speeding up his workflow in sorting out his matches for his family. Gramps showed a Heatmap based on place of latitude and longitude. He even had one out in the middle of the ocean which he explained was where someone had died while on a voyage. John spent time in explaining how to use the search engine and what they had done to help with searches on birth dates and unknown surnames of which many of us had not considered. But if you had someone who had entered an order, they most likely will be entered as either Brother, Sister or Mother so and so in the newspaper. A great way to find records.

The guest for the 27 September is Robert Braiden from "**WalkaboutWithRob**". He walks around Brisbane suburbs and talks about the historical buildings or places. A must to come and join us.
