There have apparently been some queries about the Bequest Brochures which were emailed to all members recently – the funds for the printing and posting of these came from part of a Bequest. GSQ has sent a letter of concern to New Zealand's Minister for Internal Affairs and Workplace Relations and Safety following the recent closure of the Archives New Zealand Digitisation Program and On Demand Service. Some 250,000 New Zealanders now



call Australia home, The Digitisation Program and the On Demand Service are just so important for former New Zealand residents trying to discover their Family History.

Given the worrying trend of Cyber attacks in Australia, GSQ has applied for a Grant to fund presentations from an expert who would be able to provide advice to us all about Cyber Security – what we should and should not be doing to keep ourselves safe online, whether it be on our computers (or devices) or on our phones.

At the recent Interest Group meeting it was reported that members are using GSQ computers to try to access their emails and, in so doing, are unwittingly exposing GSQ to a possible Cyber attack. All members are advised that GSQ computers are not to be used to retrieve emails while you are at our premises— please do this on one of your own devices.

Colonial & Convict Interest Group

The next meeting for Colonial & Convict Connections is on Sunday 11 August at GSQ & is a hybrid meeting.

Currently our group is the only GSQ interest group with a focus on early Australian history. For this reason, our members have agreed to extend the period of research to include Federation. Please note that having convict heritage is not essential for membership of our group.

Our June edition of the *Chronicle* has been printed and distributed by mail or email recently. PDF copies are \$15 and hard copies are \$20 annually. Currently the *Chronicle* is compiled three times per year and available in February, June and October.

At our recent meeting, our members shared their research findings. Their task was to discover the crime committed by a convict ancestor and the sentence imposed. Alternatively, some members chose to identify the reason their ancestor chose to emigrate to Australia either independently or as part of an assisted immigration scheme. The result was an interesting meeting with a range of diverse personal stories. The economic and social conditions from 1788 to 1850 were considered to offer some context to the lives of our ancestors.

At our next meeting there will be more stories of convict and immigrant ancestors as they set out on the voyages to their new homeland.

We hope you can join us at 10am on Sunday, August 11. For anyone unable to attend the GSQ Library, ZOOM will definitely be available.

Scottish Group

Library & CDs at GSQ

Have you ever looked at the Titles and contents of the CDs that GSQ has?

The majority of these CDs are not on the internet, and besides it means you can search the whole CD for any of your names all at once.

The CD shelf has undergone a clean-up. Those CDs that were no longer working have been removed; if they required a program to run it has now been installed on the computer directly underneath the shelf – computer 15; many are in pdf/excel/word format making it easy to search and view.

All the CDs have a label on them, advising you if a program and which program icon to use, or if a pdf type file etc.

They are also now all in order, so no longer do you need to hunt for the CD that might have ended up elsewhere on the shelf. New markers for when you take out a CD to use are in the process of being made, and we would like to encourage all members when they visit GSQ to go and look and just see what you might find in these valuable records.

There are also markers available for you to use when you remove a book to read, this makes it very easy to put it back in the right place for others to find and read as well. Please use them. If you have any problems or forgot where your book was to go back, then please give the book to the research assistants on duty and they will then be able to locate the exact spot.



RootsIreland are delighted to announce their additions addition of over 13,000 new Roman Catholic baptismal and marriage records from North Mayo. These latest additions bring the majority of North Mayo Roman Catholic parish records available on <u>rootsireland.ie</u> up to the year 1923.

- RootsIreland have the most complete and most accurate set of Roman Catholic church records online, as well as millions of Protestant records, civil records, census records, headstone inscriptions and census substitutes. Our index is easily searchable and has features such as standardised surname and forename searches which make your searches even more user-friendly.
- We hold over 23 million records, and our database is being added to continually. Since 2020, we have added over 1 million records to our database from Limerick, Clare, Sligo, Kerry, Wicklow, Westmeath, Kilkenny, South Dublin, South Tipperary, Monaghan, Armagh, North Mayo, Cork, Laois, Offaly and East Galway. In 2024 so far, we have added over 83,500 records from Kerry, Monaghan and Tipperary, with more to come throughout the year!

GSQ has two subscriptions to RootsIreland and it is available to members from home, through MyGSQ, as well as from the library.
