We found out with help from Helen Smith that using transcribous first and then using either copilot or GPTChat you can get a wonderful result at transcribing the old English wills that many of us struggle to transcribe word by word. this makes it so much quicker and easy enough to update the few corrections you will need to do. There is always a few corrections that will need to be done but generally doing it this way is great. The secret is in learning how to write the correct commands for the Al program to understand what and how you would like to get the output. Once you master that, then it becomes much easier. We would like to encourage everyone just to give it a try and see what you can do. Helen and I would like to thank all that attend this group and we wish you all a Merry Xmas and a Happy New Year, and will see you in March 2025.

Society of Genealogists (UK)

Family Histories Podcasts: Series Eight of the podcasts has arrived. The guests for this series are:

Danielle and Galeet Dardashti, Richard Holt, Jennifer Jones, Daniel Loftus, Adam Simpson-York, Bob Sorrentino and Sylvia Valentine.

The new series began with 'The Marchioness' with Bob Sorrentio on 5 November 2024, and is available on the website for free or from wherever you get your podcasts.

John London: Britain's First Black Voter? Dr Gillian Williamson has written on the History of Parliament blog about her groundbreaking research into John London, a Black Londoner voting in a parliamentary election. You cn access the blog here.

British Library: More than 1,000 of the British Library's digitised manuscripts are available to view online again. Discover the manuscriots here.

Seventeenth-century Wills now on Zooniverse: The Zooniverse site has uploaded new wills dating 1664-1666. Explore this new batch of seventeenth-century wills on the Zooniverse site.

Bethnal Green Roll of Honour: In 1920 the Metropolitan Borough of Bethnal Green began a Roll of Honour to record the names of those from the Borough who were killed during the War. The pages from this book have now been digitised by local Idea Store staff. View online.

ScotlandsPeople has released over 180,000 new records from Barlinnie prison. The records document life inside Scotland's largest and most infamous gaol from 1882-1899. They also include over 2,000 prisoner photographs.

You can search for prisoners by forename, surname, age, country of birth, and trial court. The records provide descriptions of the crime, sentence, appearance and health of the prisoner. Search <u>prison records online</u>.

Foundling Hospital Archive Goes Digital: Coram has launched a digital archive of almost 100,000 pages of records from England's first home for abandoned babies, the Foundling Hospital. The archive, covering 1739 to 1899, reveals the stories of over 20,000 children and includes touching petition letters from their birth mothers.

Part of Coram's *Voices Through Time* project, the archive provides valuable insights into childcare, education, and the lives of working-class women. Family historians can explore details about children, parents, staff, and apprentices. The records are free to access and searchable <u>online</u>.

Women as child carers: Arranging and compensating mothering in early modern Lancashire by Emily Rhodes

An article inspired by a database of fifty petitions submitted to the Lancashire Quarter Session Courts between 1660 and 1720 to locate mothers who cared for non-kin children in early modern England has been published online. It is free to read.

Locating London's Past Update: The Digital Humanities Institute has launched a substantially updated version of Locating London's Past, the website which allows you to map a wide body of digital resources pertaining to early modern and eighteenth-century London onto John Rocque's 1746 map.

Book a Session in Buckinghamshire Archives' Virtual Searchroom: Can't visit Buckinghamshire Archives in person? Book a Virtual Searchroom session to view original documents live, in real-time, via Microsoft Teams. You'll be able to view up to 5 documents, and a staff member will assist by arranging the records and providing basic information. Sessions are available on Thursdays and Fridays, with two time slots each day. Book at least 2 working days in advance by emailing archives@buckinghamshire.gov.uk or calling 01296 382 587.

Remembering the Jewish Pogroms of 1918-1921: The Am haZikaron Institute has launched a website dedicated to preserving the memory of the Jewish pogroms in Russia from 1918 to 1921. These brutal massacres resulted in the deaths of 300,000 Jews, leaving countless others raped, displaced, or orphaned.

The website serves as a comprehensive resource for understanding the scale of this tragedy. It includes eyewitness accounts, victim lists, a visual catalogue of over 1,500 affected towns, and information on Jewish self-defence efforts. Visitors can explore lectures, seminars, and educational resources, including a course for teachers and the publication of the book Russia: Three-Year Pogrom.
