A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

What a great sight at Stackpole Street today – there were so many people researching and working in other ways that the carpark was full and overflowing – some people needed to park on the street outside!! The Research Centre was simply buzzing!!

Attendance at the Members' Meeting on 24 June was small with the main item on the Agenda being a decision made at the Management Committee's June meeting to remove the word "Special" from Interest Group names and begin referring to them simply as Interest Groups. **The next Members' Meeting is planned for Monday 2 September.**

Our talks in Brisbane City Council Libraries raise money for GSQ. We are looking for more people who would like to speak in the libraries. Each year we send a list of topics offered and the library coordinator allocates the talks to the libraries. We are given 2-3 months notice of when the talks will be. Our Librarians are continuing to do things to make our Library an interesting and useful place to visit. In their Report to the June Management Committee meeting Sandy and Kim reported on accessions to our Library catalogue – in May 2024 alone, there were nearly 44,000 visits to the Catalogue, with close to 60,000 pages being searched resulting in 65,000 hits. Are you making full use of the Library in this way??

Those of you who visit Stackpole Street will be aware that a Journal Room has been established for Print Journals in the vicinity of the Reception Desk – these Journals hold some interesting and valuable information which, at this stage, is largely untapped. Kay Aberdeen who has managed Print Journals for GSQ for many years, together with our Librarians, is seeking members to catalogue Journal articles to make these more accessible for all



members. No prior Library experience is required, but being computer literate with attention to detail and being able to summarise a story into a paragraph would be good skills to have. Currently our group is the only GSQ interest group with a focus on early Australian history. For this reason, our members have agreed to extend the period of research to include Federation. Please note that having convict heritage is not essential for membership of our group.

Our June edition of the *Chronicle* has been printed and distributed by mail or email recently. PDF copies are \$15 and hard copies are \$20 annually. Currently the *Chronicle* is compiled three times per year and available in February, June and October.

At our recent meeting, our members shared their research findings. Their task was to discover the crime committed by a convict ancestor and the sentence imposed. Alternatively, some members chose to identify the reason their ancestor chose to emigrate to Australia either independently or as part of an assisted immigration scheme. The result was an interesting meeting with a range of diverse personal stories. The economic and social conditions from 1788 to 1850 were considered to offer some context to the lives of our ancestors.

At our next meeting there will be more stories of convict and immigrant ancestors as they set out on the voyages to their new homeland.

We hope you can join us at 10am on Sunday, August 11. For anyone unable to attend the GSQ Library, ZOOM will definitely be available..

Overcoming Scanning Challenges

Preserve Slides, Photo Negatives and Oher Family Heirlooms

In general, the higher the resolution (measured in dpi, for dots per inch), the more you can enlarge the image without getting that grainy, pixilated look. But higher-resolution files also are bigger and hog space on your computer or in your cloud storage, so you don't want to scan everything at the highest-available dpi.

Instead, go with these rules of thumb: **Blog or Website dpi**

If you plan to post the digitized image to a blog or website, the standard is 72 dpi.

Printing dpi

If you want to print the image at its original size, scan at least 300 dpi.

Archiving dpi

If you're scanning old letters and other documents to archive, use 300 dpi. (But notes, receipts and papers you're not intending to archive are fine at 72 dpi.) HDTV Screen dpi

If you plan to view the scanned photos on your HDTV screen, use a minimum of 300 dpi for 4×6 -inch originals, and higher dpi for smaller originals.

Enlarging a Photo dpi

If you want to enlarge the photo up to double in size (for printing or on-screen zooming-in and examining), scan it at least 600 dpi.

If you'll want to more than **double the size of the original photo**, go even higher with the dpi. At 900 dpi, a 4×6 -inch printed photo turns into a 16×24 -inch digital image.

If the **original photo is small**, scan at 600 dpi or higher. If you scan a 2×3 -inch photo at 1200 dpi, for example, it will become a 16×24 -inch digital image without losing quality.

Unknown Use for Photo dpi

If you don't know how the digitized photo will be used or you're scanning it to archive for posterity, scan at least 600 and up to 1200 dpi.

Specialty Photo dpi

If the original is a tintype or daguerreotype, scan at 1200 dpi.

Remember that you can always save a copy to a lower resolution, but you can't add image quality without re-scanning the original.
