The next meeting of the German Group is 28 July at GSQ and via Zoom.


The German Group had a very enthusiastic meeting on the 26 May 2024 which was a hybrid meeting.

What's New ... Fold3 and Newspapers.com

With thanks to the GSQ's FHTech and the Scottish Special Interest Groups who have paid for these subscriptions members now have access at the Resource Centre as well as at home via the MyGSQ portal to use both Fold3 and Newspapers.com.

We only have 1 licence for each, so at times you may not be able to access as someone else is using it, but by restricting your usage to an hour you often overcome these issues.

Fold3 is a place where you can discover your military ancestors with over 670 million records available. Even though the site covers all the United States wars, there are also plenty of records regarding the UK, Australia, New Zealand, and Canada plus many countries of Europe to do searching on.

It is an easy site to search. On the left you can select Place, Conflict, Title Collection, Branch, meaning Army, Navy or Air Force and if you know the Publication, Name and Type and even the Record Type can be searched.

The search box itself will pick up all the words you put into the search box, and you can also filter regarding dates, places and military.

Newspapers.com is like Fold3 in which it is predominately USA newspapers but many other countries including Australia, Canada, Ireland, NZ and the UK are represented.

Searching again is easy. Select the Country, State or County, and City and then time frame or the newspaper itself. Many of the UK etc cover the later years of the last century but you can be in for surprises on some of the dates available going back to the late 1700s and early 1800s.

The major advantage of having access to these two subscriptions is that it now gives our members a wider coverage of sites that they can use to assist with their research. Just keep in mind that a very large number of our ancestors' brothers and sisters emigrated to the USA never to return to England, Scotland or Ireland. From searching these two sets of records you can now start to fill in some of those gaps regarding them.



GSQ ZOOM Meetings

Monday Morning ZOOM for GSQ Members Only, starting at 11:00 AM AEST

We have been continuing to look at various records mostly in England regarding someone alive in the 1790's as this tends to be a stopping point for many of us in relation to just "How do I prove this is my person". Many ideas and the use of FamilySearch and Old Parish Clerks sites for some of the English counties have proved to be invaluable in what they do hold to help with these questions.

Helen Connor also gave a very informative talk on Barbados, and it was surprising that out of the group we had that day there were 3 people who also had Barbados connections.

In June we will examine the ways of searching in the two new sites GSQ has available for its members from the Resource Centre as well as in MyGSQ from home. These are *Fold3* and *Newspapers.com* both sites that can assist with information regarding your USA ancestors as many Irish, English and Scottish emigrated there as well as to Australia or New Zealand.

Wednesday Night ZOOM, open to everyone & FREE starting @ 7:00 PM AEST

We have had an interesting month, with the 2nd Wednesday based around the Women in our family history, whether they died young, lived an exciting life or a hero in many of our eyes just because of what they did in everyday life. Our guest speaker for May was Dan Kelly from Boolarong Press who took us using plain language so that we could all understand the process of making sure your manuscript was set out correctly right through to the final finished product with the printer and publisher. We all had a better understanding of what we need to do now before heading straight to the printer's office.

This coming month as we head into June, our Winter fires and hot stews will be in our minds, so the topic for the 2nd Wednesday night 12th June, will be "How did your ancestor cope during the Winter months?" – What have you found out

about the climate where they lived during that time and was there any prolonged cold, freezing events that stand out.

Our guest speaker for June 26th will be Fleur Creed discussing Mind-Mapping. It is a tool that is simple to use to help analyse what is missing, what is important in relation to one or more of your ancestors. It is also colours to use. So come along to listen and see something that is different to use but very effective in its outcome.

Research Learning and Support for GSQ Members Only 1st & 3rd Wednesdays of each month starting at 11:00 AM AEST

Our Wednesday Morning Zoom session held on 1 May was a presentation on Scanning your documents and images, explaining the step by step method to use a scanner to get the best image and save it to your family history files.

Two weeks later during our topic meeting, we had another great Learning Aid sessions for our mid-month meetings with tackling where and how to locate the exact location our ancestors came from.

After a discussion this was followed by a test case of an immigrant into New South Wales in 1838, during which the small groups of four each went through the process of deciphering the difficult to read, but very informative details

on a husband and his wife and children, and working out just where the mis-spelt locations they came from, were.

Our Zooms are on the 1st and also the 3rd Wednesday of each month at 11am and they usually go for about 90 minutes with notes distributed afterwards.

Volunteers Document Liverpool State Hospital records

Thanks to the dedicated efforts of Collections Volunteers, who have been tirelessly working from home, we have successfully listed over 57,000 patient admission cards from Liverpool State Hospital and Home. These records, spanning from 1884 to 1959, hold a wealth of historical information that is invaluable to our understanding of the past.

Liverpool State Hospital and Home was originally established as a branch of the Sydney Benevolent Society in 1851 and provided refuge for infirm and destitute men. In November 2000, the City of Liverpool and District Historical Society returned to the State Archives Collection several records from the Liverpool State Hospital and Home that had been in its custody since the closure of the Hospital. As part of this arrangement, all records, including inmate records created by the Liverpool State Hospital and Home, 1890-1959, are open to public access. (This is an exception to the access direction that closes all patientidentifying medical records for 110 years.)

The volunteer project covers the records in two series:

NRS-23159 Admission cards - Deaths [Liverpool State Hospital and Home], 1884-1958

NRS-23160 Admission cards discharges - [Liverpool State Hospital and Home], 1891-1959

Over 33,400 cards (78% of the series) from NRS-23160 have been digitised and are available to view in the catalogue (type NRS-2316 First name, Last name into the search box to search the records in this series).

Anna Gray, Officer, Collection Digitisation, has been progressively adding the item listings, along with the digital copy of each card, to our website.

New online: Jenolan Caves photo album

State Records NSW have recently digitised a two-volume photo album set dating from 1887 that captures the spectacular Jenolan Caves in the Blue Mountains. This is now available to view in full in our online catalogue.

The photographs were taken using electric and magnesium lights to illuminate the dark interiors of the caves, and are presented in the album with descriptions for each image.

The albums were printed by the NSW Government Printer, and identical copies were presented to Lord Carrington, then Governor of NSW, following his visits to the caves in 1887 and 1889. See the photo albums here.

Land grants and leases registers, 1792–1865

This is an index of the first six volumes of the Surveyor General's Registers of Land Grants and Leases (7/445, 7/447-451) and contains all grants to 1819, mainland grants to 1822, and County of Cumberland grants for 1823–65.

The registers contain a record of all land grants made (both free and by purchase) up to 1843, from which date separate registers of land purchases and town purchases were kept.

<u>Search this index</u> by place, first name or last name.

Convict indents (digitised) index, 1788-1801

Convict indents list the convicts transported to NSW. Early indents provide name, date and place of trial, and sentence, while the later indents usually contain more information, such as a physical description of the convict, place of origin, age and crime.

Index sources include lists of convicts attached to orders in council, convict indents, and alphabetical indents (1788–1800), many with annotations

relating to certificates of freedom, tickets of leave, pardons and other information.

<u>Search this index</u> by first name, last name or transport ship.

Colonial Secretary's minutes, 1826–1927

In 1826, Governor Darling instituted a system of conveying official instructions to the Colonial Secretary through minutes and memoranda.

These records range from brief administrative instructions to comprehensive documents that dealt with the more important matters of government. They often include detailed plans and proposals, but also capture the lives of individual people.
