British Newspaper Archive Mar 2 @ 9:00 AM – 11:00 AM AEST Presenter: Sue Reid Cost: Members \$21 Non–members \$31 Virtual via Zoom

The British Newspaper Archive (BNA), available directly through the BNA site or via Findmypast, is a continually improving resource. More than 71 million pages of newsprint, over 2,300 newspaper titles, and 323 years of history are available for searching. Coverage is not confined to England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. You can also find newspaper titles from the Channel Islands, India, Pakistan, the West Indies, British Guyana, New Zealand, Hong Kong, and some African nations. <u>BOOK HERE</u>

This session will cover how to start your Italian family research. It begins with finding Australian arrivals and then moves back to researching in Italy. You'll learn about the records held in Italy – how to find them, and how to read them. These include records created by civil authorities, the Roman Catholic church, and cemetery records. "Tommy this, an' Tommy that" – the British Army 1899–1918 Apr 23@ 7:00 PM – 9:00 PM AEST Presenter: Paul Nixon Cost: Members \$21 Non–members \$31 Virtual via Zoom

The talk will look at the component parts of the British Army on the outbreak of the Boer War: the regular army, the militia and the Volunteer Force, and how these different arms each had a part to play. I'll look at the changes to the army in 1908 which saw the militia and Volunteer Force replaced by the Special Reserve and Territorial Force respectively, and how the army massively evolved during the First World War. <u>BOOK HERE</u> Some interest groups will be holding their meetings at GSQ. Latest changes to the GSQ Website

We would like to thank everyone for being patient while we transitioned to our new MembershipWorks program. We had a few challenges which have now been rectified.

One of these was accessing MyGSQ directly from within "Membership Sign in and Manage Account" – this is now working. You only need to use your new sign in, which is your membership email address and password. From the MyGSQ Tab, click on MyGSQ and you will be taken to our members only pages. You will need to sign in again on that page, but no more needing to know two sets of passwords.

The Membership Sign in and Manage Account is where you also Renew your membership with GSQ. Again, sign in with your email address and password – this will take you immediately to your details – please correct anything that is incorrect as well as changing your password if you wish to. At the bottom of this page are your renewal details, and if you have completed any changes including changing your password, you must click on the Save & Continue button at the bottom of this page. You still have the option to pay by credit card, bank transfer or at GSQ but you must complete the renewal process online, the same as you did previously. The renewal fees for members changed on the 1st February, please make sure you select the correct membership type when doing your renewal.

All events now require members to sign in to their account when making any booking. This is a great advantage to have, as your events, payments now all show in your History. This means if you have already booked an event and cannot remember if you have or not, a quick look in this section will tell you. You can even see how and when you paid for the event. The date and time of the event are also shown.

When you book an event now, you will receive the Zoom link automatically within the registration ticket. You need to make sure you retain this so that you can attend the event.

Armagh & Londonderry, Absent Voters Lists, 1918 -Ancestry

This was the final year of the First World War, and many of the absent voters were in the military, the Merchant Marine, or the Red Cross. The Londonderry list includes about 4,000 names, and the Armagh list contains about 3,500 names.

The Irish Community Arcive Network (iCAN) was established by the Natina Museum of Ireland in 2009. In 2023, the Heritage Coucil joined as a new funding partner, It is currently comprised of 33 digital archives developed & managed by communuty groups in counties Clare, Cork, Galway, Mayo & Wicklow.

Lots to investigate, and chosen at random: <u>Bridget Moore 1818–1892</u>, Gorthfahy, Co Mayo.

Headford Lace Trail

This is out of left field but it's a wonderful, prize–winning, local history project. Launched in autumn 2023 it is winner of an international competition. You can listen to the walk/talk <u>virtually.</u> It's 55 minutes long, and a treat.

Ireland memorial inscriptions -FindMyPast

This <u>new and improved set</u>, spanning the years 1711–2019, contains 882 images and transcriptions.
