Colonial & Convict Interest Group

The next meeting for the Colonial and Convicts interest Group: Australia 1788-1901 is at 10am on Sunday 13 October 2024 and is a hybrid meeting.

This month an important item of news is that at our April meeting, the members decided to adopt a new (and shorter) name, the "Colonial and Convict Interest Group". This name is "Colonial" because we cover the entire period from the arrival of the First Fleet to Federation in 1901, and "Convict" because we also focus on our convict heritage.

Please don't think that it is mandatory to have 6 or 7 convicts or possibly only one convict! The only requirement is a passion for early Australian history. If that sounds like you, please join us on the second Sunday of all even months of the year. Our group aims to stimulate and promote valuable insight into our ancestors' lifetimes prior to Federation.

Each meeting over several months will see our members research and present their ancestors' experiences at different stages of their journey to, and what happened in, Australia. This began at our April meeting which included a presentation on the social, economic and legal environment in the facing our ancestors in the late 18th century and the early 19th century. This helped to understand why our ancestors chose to emigrate and why some of our ancestors became convicts. Each member outlined their ancestor's experience and in the case of free settlers, why they decided to leave for Australia.

At the next meeting on Sunday 11th August, we will share our research findings about our ancestors embarking and then voyaging to Australia. Some will travel directly here, and others (particularly free settlers), via stopovers in other Countries.

I hope to see you there. Those members unable to attend in person please join us via Zoom. Our meeting starts at 10am and all visitors will be most welcome.

What's New ...

Changes at London Metropolitan Archives

As part of the City of London Corporation, London Metropolitan Archives is the second largest archive service in the UK, recording the history of the capital from 1067, preserving and sharing the stories of Londoners, businesses, charities, hospitals, schools, community groups and many others.

On 5 August, the name will change from 'London Metropolitan Archives' to 'The London Archives'.

They are developing a new website, a new digital home for The London Archives, which will provide clear information about our services, exhibitions, and events, and share a range of engaging content about the collections, to inspire experienced and new researchers alike.

National Museum of the Royal Navy Collections Catalogue

The National Museum of the Royal Navy has recently put its Collections Catalogue online. The Museum tells the story of the four fighting forces of the British Royal Navy; the Royal Marines, the Fleet Air Arm, the Submarine Service, and the Surface Fleet.

Legacy Family Tree 10, a popular genealogy software for PC, has just released its latest version, now available for free. This upgrade includes all features, tools, and reports previously exclusive to the Deluxe Edition. New features such as the FAN Club Report, Mapping, and DNA Center enhance the user experience by providing insights into ancestor relationships and locations and tracking family DNA tests. Welsh Women's Peace Petition

The Welsh Women's Peace Petition project, which celebrates a 100-year-old petition containing almost 400,000 signatures of people claiming world peace, has reached another milestone. Following a period of cataloguing the petitions, the detailed work of digitising each page has been completed, and the entire petition is now on the National Library of Wales website.

MyHeritage

MyHeritage has announced the launch of a new collaboration between MyHeritage and FamilyTreeDNA. This will enable FamilyTreeDNA customers to transfer their family trees to MyHeritage and to continue building them on MyHeritage. FamilyTreeDNA users can now easily transfer their family trees to MyHeritage for free, after providing consent on both FamilyTreeDNA and MyHeritage.

This collaboration expands the two companies' longstanding partnership and will provide FamilyTreeDNA customers with access to MyHeritage's robust suite of genealogy tools and features, many of which are not available on FamilyTreeDNA.

This process is voluntary; however, transferring the tree data to MyHeritage is encouraged, as FamilyTreeDNA will officially sunset their family tree builder on September 9, 2024. At that point, all family trees on FamilyTreeDNA will become readonly. For more details, read the blog post.

Findmypast

There are new additions from Broadstairs to Bath to discover this week. Findmypast have added 6,284 records from three English counties this week. If your family tree has roots in Buckinghamshire, Kent or Somerset, you may spot a familiar name or two within these three updated record sets.

Last week Findympast added 24,453 church records from England, Scotland and the United States to their *Catholic Heritage Archive* this week.

They've added 22,586 English Catholic birth, marriage and death records.
These additions - all from 1914 - cover Birmingham, London, Northampton and Nottingham.

Their Catholic record collection for Scotland grew this week as 1, 829 birth, marriage and death records from 1934, 1949 and 1974 were added.

If you've got roots in America's Keystone State, you may find a familiar name or two within these new Roman Catholic records from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
