(Another valuable document now available for purchase is the Proof of Identity Certificate. This formal document verifies your genealogical link to a convict. To qualify, forward the evidence required in support of your claim as well as \$25 for your certificate.)


GSQ in your local BCC library

Queensland's St. Helena Island Hell Hole of the Pacific By James M Gray



The St Helena Penal Establishment was situated on a small Island in Moreton Bay, some 5 km from the mouth of the Brisbane River, covered approximately 88 hectares above the high water line and was one of the loveliest islands in the bay.

The elevated tableland on which the prison was built looked like a large rugged block of ruby and emerald rising out of the sea. Its steep chocolate brown patches of rich soil, bordered with green fields of cultivation and bases of grass and shimmering sand provided a striking first picture of the island.

It has had a fascinating history from the time it was first discovered; but its most important period began when it became a high-security colonial prison in 1867. The overcrowding of Brisbane's gaols resulted in the conversion of buildings originally intended for a quarantine station on St. Helena Island, into accommodations for prisoners convicted for a wide variety of crimes.

Are there websites that will help me do my family history for free?

Yes, plenty. There are a number of websites with free access to essential clues. There are also a vast range of websites with free tools – such as those to help you:

- build your family tree online;
- download free charts and forms to keep your records straight;
- gather collections of photos of places from yesteryear;
- find historic maps;
- read digitised old books;
- and explore indexes and even, sometimes, digitised images.

What do I need to pay for?

Take a free trial! If you're new to family history it's worth taking advantage of any free trial periods so that you can explore each site and see which suits you best. Be sure to cancel within the trial period if you don't wish to take up a subscription

What's New ...

A new open-access book, Inheriting the Family: Objects, Identities and Emotions, edited by Katie Barclay, Tanya Evans, Joanne Begiato, Laura King, and Ashley Barnwell, explores how family inheritances shape personal identity, cultural heritage, and national memory. Utilising methodologies from the history and sociology of emotions, the collection examines the selection of specific family tokens and their transition from private keepsakes to public heritage. Through diverse case studies - including Victorian library chairs, guilts, religious texts, and intergenerational writings - the book delves into the emotional significance of inherited objects across various social, racial, and ethnic groups. Published by Bloomsbury Academic in 2025, the ebook is available under a CC BY-NC-ND 4.0 license on bloomsburycollections.com, with open access funded by UK Research and Innovation.

Historic England has acquired the Janette Rosing Collection, comprising over 8,000 original black and white photographs from the mid-19th to early 20th centuries. This collection offers a comprehensive visual record of England's architecture, landscapes, and maritime history during a transformative period marked by industrialisation and urbanisation. The photographs, taken by prominent photographers of the era, cover every English county and include various photographic processes of the time. Janette Rosing, a renowned photographic consultant, dedicated her life to amassing this collection, which has been acquired through the UK Government's Acceptance in Lieu scheme. Historic England plans to conserve, catalogue, and digitize the collection, making it accessible to the public and preserving it for future generations. Search the Archive here.

Trove.scot is a new online platform that brings together a vast range of historical and archaeological resources in one place. By integrating data from the Historic Environment Portal, Canmore, SCRAN, and the Property in Care Collections, it provides a comprehensive research tool for anyone interested in Scotland's past. Whether you're an academic, heritage professional, or history enthusiast, Trove.scot offers access to information on listed buildings, designated sites, and archival imagery, making it easier than ever to explore Scotland's rich heritage. This project has been made possible with funding from the Historic Scotland Foundation.

The National Archives of Ireland has announced that the 1926 Census records will be digitized and made freely available online on April 18, 2026. This release will provide a detailed snapshot of life in Ireland a century ago, offering invaluable insights for genealogists and historians. The Amsterdam City Archives has unveiled a major website overhaul, making it easier than ever to explore its vast collection of 50 kilometers of paper records and millions of digital files. A new unified search engine now allows users to seamlessly browse archival descriptions, indexes, and images all in one place - instantly accessing available digital documents. This streamlined experience replaces the previous need to switch between different sections, offering a smoother and more intuitive way to uncover Amsterdam's rich history. The U.S. National Archives has acquired a significant collection of historical documents from Arlington National Cemetery, spanning from the 1830s to the 1970s. Ever since the first women police officers in NSW were appointed in 1915, the history of women in Australia's oldest police organisation has been a succession of 'firsts': the first to be issued with uniforms (1948), the first to be able to participate in a graduation ceremony with their male colleagues (1958), the first to be sworn in as officers with full powers and equal entitlements (1965) and the first to be assigned to general duties (1976). <u>Read more here.</u>

Gaol inmates & prisoners photos index 1870-1930. The Gaol Photographic Description Books contain a photograph of each prisoner and the following information: number, prisoners' name, aliases, date when portrait was taken, native place, year of birth, details of arrival in the colony - ship and year of arrival, trade or occupation, religion, standard of education, height, weight (on committal, on discharge), colour of hair, colour of eyes, marks or special features, number of previous portrait, where and when tried, offence, sentence, remarks, and details of previous convictions (where and when, offence and sentence).
