


Finding non-British Subjects in Queensland records

Do you have ancestors from outside the British Isles who were not British Subjects? Even prior to Federation, non-British subjects were subjected to a raft of restrictions which generated genealogically valuable records. This surveillance accelerated after 1901 and during the two World Wars when their movements were closely tracked. As non-British Subjects did not appear on the electoral roll, it is these alternate records which may help you place your ancestors in the absence of census returns. BOOK HERE

Thanks to all who have returned Containers to various depots during the month. A total of \$92.90 was added to GSQ's coffers during June. Genealogists tend to get very excited about new records and sources they come across in their research. So much so that they grab a quick copy, download it to default folders, and move on to the next item without thoroughly exploring the source first. All too often they don't take the time to evaluate the source, to write the citation(s) for the source, or to file it in the correct spot. We have to slow down and take the time to think, to file, and to create notes about the source that make it easy to find that source again if needed. Colonial & Convict Interest Group

Currently our group is the only GSQ interest group with a focus on early Australian history. For this reason, our members have agreed to extend the period of research to include Federation. Please note that having convict heritage is not essential for membership of our group.

Our June edition of the Chronicle has been printed and distributed by mail or email recently. Pdf copies are \$15 and hard copies are \$20 annually. Currently the Chronicle is compiled three times per year and available in February, June and October.

At our recent meeting, our members shared their research findings. Their task was to discover the crime committed by a convict ancestor and the sentence imposed. Alternatively, some members chose to identify the reason their ancestor chose to emigrate to Australia either independently or as part of an assisted immigration scheme. The result was an interesting meeting with a range of diverse personal stories. The economic and social conditions from 1788 to 1850 were considered to offer some context to the lives of our ancestors.

At our next meeting there will be more stories of convict and immigrant ancestors as they set out on the voyages to their new homeland.

Museums of History NSW

New index – Registers of Appointments [Civil Service Board], 1885–96

We're pleased to announce the release of the Registers of Appointments [Civil Service Board] Index containing over 15,000 entries, fully digitised and discoverable online through our website. The index has been created by our amazing volunteers.

The registers were created by the Civil Service Board from 1885 to 1896, when the Board's responsibilities included conducting qualifying examinations for the appointment and promotion of civil servants, presenting to the minister a list of qualified people for each vacant position, and serving as the central controlling authority of a large number of NSW Government departments.

Information recorded in the registers can include the date from which the appointment is effective, name, age, position, department, office, date of first appointment, details of transfers, salary, and date of notification of appointment and how notified, whether by Gazette notice (entered in black) or by departmental notification (entered in red).

The index is searchable by employee's first name, surname, department and date appointed. <u>SEARCH</u>

Our Learning Aid session on 18 June centered around researching settlers with the Northern Territory in the 1880s period with the small groups each putting their thinking caps on as to where the records were held and what else may be available to assist NT research. This proved to be a particularly challenging effort, with one website offline and as the region as such didn't become a territory in the Commonwealth of Australia until 1 January 1911.

Our meetings are on the 1st and the 3rd Wednesday of each month at 11am and they go for about 90 minutes with notes distributed afterwards.

Toowong Cemetery and more ...

Toowong Cemetery was officially opened 5 July 1875. Friends of Toowong Cemetery will be doing a guided tour 6th July at Toowong Cemetery commemorating the sesquicentenary <u>https://www.fotc.au/guided-</u> tours/#guided-tours

The land (250 acres 1 rood) for the cemetery was first reserved for that purpose in 1866. Notice of the Brisbane Cemetery Reserve was gazetted, 8 October 1870 (QGG V11-93-p1300) and the Cemetery Trustees were appointed 7 October 1870.

I downloaded the digitised original burial register for Toowong from the Queensland State Archives (QSA). On the 3rd January 1871 the first burial was

of Colonel Samuel Wensley Blackall the second Governor of Queensland. He is buried in a prominent position, the highest spot, which was personally chosen by him. His funeral cortege moved after the service from St John's Church and went the approximately seven kilometres to the site of Brisbane General Cemetery, now Toowong Cemetery. The cortege reached the burial site just before 7pm, and the graveside service was then held.

There were seven burials before the official opening on 5th July 1875, two of which were held the day before on Sunday 4th July. The Gordon children, burials 6 & 7 were placed in the same grave. Their death notice Courier Mail-Gordon: On the 2nd July at Milton Florence Caroline aged 3 years and 10 months and on the 3rd Ethel Maude aged 1 year and 4 months only daughters of P.R and Emily F Gordon. Sadly, their eldest son Herbert George dies 10th July, is buried the 11th July, burial entry 9.

J.K. Handy was reburied 14th August 1875 having been removed from Paddington Cemetery (entry 35, probably John Kileen Handy who died in 1874)

In the register, there are a number of stillborn children burials. These entries and sometimes also those in Funeral Directors' records may be the only record you will find of stillborn children.



Entry: Sept 3, 1875, Burial of bones from Museum Gothenburg. Now, there has to be a story in that! And there is!

The Gothenburg left Port Darwin bound for Melbourne

with 125 people including crew, and 3500ozs of gold on board. She struck the reef about 7pm, 24 February during a heavy north-westerly gale. On the 27 February 1875, the Gothenburg was reported as being a complete wreck. Over the next few days 22 survivors were found. Sadly 103 lives were lost. No women or children survived.

A diver, James Putwain retrieved the gold with great difficulty. He saw the bodies of two women but had insufficient air hose to retrieve them. He caught two sharks, one of which he found a human skull and bones and in the other a quantity of human bones and apparel. The bones were forwarded

to Brisbane, and it is these bones that were buried 3 September.

These and many other stories can be determined from the Toowong Burial Registers which have been digitsed by Queensland State Archives. Queensland State Archives have digitised many original records which are available as PDF downloads.

At the QSA ArchivesSearch screen click Item and then Records with digital objects only and then do a keyword search (can also be fun to leave the keyword blank and just browse the range of records)


